






King County Fentanyl Involved Deaths by Year






Average weekly overdose deaths, 2019-2022












Fatal Fentanyl Overdoses in King County, Jan-Aug 2020-2022










Rate of overdose deaths that occured in King County in 2012 - 2021 from Medical Examiner's Office data


