Changes to Jurisdictional Housing Needs

- Slight adjustment to jurisdictional housing needs due to identified rounding errors
 Changes by +/- 1 unit except for Sammamish (-17 units)
- Affected jurisdictions:

Seattle	Kirkland	Shoreline	North Bend	Unincorporated

- Errors in state projections led to inaccurate reporting and staff correction of countywide emergency housing <u>baseline</u> units
 - o No effect on countywide or jurisdictional projected net new emergency housing needs
 - o Commerce will correct projections with final release in February 2023

Status of Countywide Need Projections

- Countywide and jurisdictional needs shown in CPP housing need tables based on:
 - o Draft October 12 projections from Commerce
 - o Preferred method selected by the AHC for allocating permanent housing need (Option 3)
 - o Emergency housing allocation method reviewed by the AHC at the last meeting
 - Percent share of planned countywide housing growth
- Countywide and jurisdictional needs draft until Commerce finalizes projections in February
 - o AHC staff will update CPP housing need tables and brief GMPC on changes in March
- How needs might change:
 - o Changes to percent share of need allocated to each income level and permanent supportive housing
 - o Changes to countywide emergency housing need projection
 - Impacts jurisdictional allocations of emergency housing needs

Recent Coordination on Emergency Housing Needs

November

- KCRHA recommended allocating based on percent share of planned housing growth countywide
- Per Commerce guidance, jurisdictions can count a portion of their 0-30% land capacity as emergency housing capacity
- Commerce will release final emergency housing need projections in February 2023

December

- AHC set to recommend CPP amendments that would allocate emergency housing need based on the method reviewed in November
- Net new emergency housing needs remain unchanged since the last AHC meeting and are still draft

Nov. 30 GMPC Meeting Recap

AHC staff presented:

- Recap of work to-date on GMPC Motion 21-1:
 - o AHC decision to recommend Option 3 as the method for allocating countywide permanent housing needs
 - o Briefing on emergency housing needs and an update on AHC coordination with Commerce
 - o AHC recommended accountability framework
 - o Proposed CPP amendments

Nov. 30 GMPC Meeting Recap

GMPC members discussed:

- Concerns from several GMPC members over jurisdictional housing needs and jurisdictional responsibilities to plan for and accommodate housing needs, including:
 - o Challenges to meet housing needs through incentives if market rate needs are low
 - o Meeting needs vs. planning for and accommodating needs clarifications
 - o Interest in exploring alternative options for permanent need allocations (Options 1 and 2)
- One member expressed disappointment over the plan certification pilot not advancing
 - o AHC staff explained low volunteer rate, desire to focus on providing technical support to a more diverse array of jurisidictions, and AHC interest in revisiting the idea in the future

FAQ on Housing Needs

- Developed by King County Regional Planning staff in coordination with AHC staff
- Addresses concerns over:
 - ✓ Relationship between growth targets and housing needs.
 - ✓ Exceeding growth targets while planning for and accommodating need
 - ✓ Planning for infrastructure considering housing needs
 - ✓ High allocations of 80% AMI and below housing needs and the use of development incentives
 - ✓ Funding challenges
 - ✓ Accountability and potentially penalties
- Leans heavily on guidance from Commerce and Revised Code of Washington language

Objectives for Today

- Review and potentially adopt final components of the AHC recommendation in response to GMPC Motion 21-1:
 - o Processes to establish methods of allocating jurisdictional permanent and emergency housing needs
 - o Accountability framework
 - o Housing-focused comprehensive plan review standards
 - o CPP amendments, including technical and substantive updates made following November 3 AHC meeting and process to ratification

GMPC Motion Requirements

The AHC shall complete a collaborative effort by the end of 2022 to:

- I. Monitor and report jurisdictional housing supply, housing affordability, housing needs, and income-restricted housing levels, including disparities between subregions and comparisons to established housing goals and targets, through the Regional Affordable Housing Dashboard and reporting.
- 2. Establish subregional or jurisdictional affordable housing needs, informed by local data and the data and methodology provided by the Department of Commerce (Commerce).
- 3. Recommend to the GMPC an accountability and implementation framework for equitably meeting affordable housing needs across the region. The AHC will consider, at a minimum, the range of Development Patterns and Housing Chapter amendments proposed by GMPC members in June 2021 regarding understanding and accommodating housing need, holding jurisdictions accountable, and allocating resources.
- 4. Recommend to the GMPC any CPP amendments necessary to implement their recommendations.

AHC Recommended Accountability Framework

I. Housing-Focused Comprehensive Plan Review

- AHC offers early guidance and assistance to jurisdictions on comprehensive plan alignment with the CPP Housing Chapter
- Before plan adoption, the AHC reviews and provide comments on plans, using comprehensive plan review standards

2. Annual Monitoring & Reporting

 AHC annually measures jurisdictional progress to plan for and accommodate housing needs in dashboard using standardized benchmarks, housing data trends, and comparative standards

3. Mid-cycle Check-in & Adjustment

- Five years after plan adoption, the GMPC identifies jurisdictions with significant shortfalls in planning for and accommodating affordable housing targets.
- The GMPC may recommend that those jurisdictions to take action to address significant shortfalls
- Jurisdictions with significant shortfalls in planning for and accommodating housing needs identify and implement actions to address them

Comprehensive Plan Review







Standards

- Comprehensive plan review standards check for:
 - I.Completeness
 - 2.Implementation strategies
 - 3. Meaningful action
- Supplementary materials assist with tracking of CPPs addressed and alert planners to unique requirements of CPPs

Process

- Technical assistance offered throughout review process
- Staff draft comment letters, with oversight from AHC Chair
- AHC reviews and issues letter
- Communication with jurisdictional staff throughout the process

Timeline

- Plans submitted to AHC at earliest possible time prior to or concurrent with the release of a public review draft
- Allows adequate time for the jurisdictions to adjust plans based on AHC comments



AHC's Adopted 2023 State Legislative Priorities



Increase capital and operating resources for affordable housing

- Increase existing funding sources, create a permanent funding source, and authorize new progressive sources
- Ensure new housing revenue tools retain local flexibility to support uses including:
 - o capital investments and ongoing operating and services support for new and existing 0-50% AMI projects
 - o projects that promote access to opportunity, anti-displacement, and wealth building opportunities for disproportionately housing cost burdened BIPOC communities



Support local jurisdictions planning for increasing affordable housing

• Fund community-based organizations from impacted communities to engage in the comprehensive plan process and shape local strategies that prevent displacement and undo racially biased exclusionary policies



Support housing stability through increased financial support to low-income households, tenant protections, and civil legal assistance

- Maintain or expand the Housing and Essential Needs program
- Increase equitable opportunities for tenants to learn about and enforce their rights
- Increase legal assistance funding to fully implement Right to Counsel
- Ban discrimination against renters based on a prior criminal record



Preserve the supply of affordable housing

• Preserve manufactured housing communities through state policies that provide tenants and nonprofits the opportunity to purchase manufactured housing communities and require longer notices for closures
