Issues	Discussion
Welcome Call to Order	Introduction of new members: Estella Williamson and Beratta Gomillion.
Meeting Minutes June 2024	The June MIDD Advisory Committee Meeting minutes were approved by consensus.
Public Comments	There were no requests for public comment.
Equity Focus	<p>Two MIDD Advisory Committee members shared how they integrate Equity in their work.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dr. Estella Williamson – Director of Harborview Abuse and Trauma Center. Williamson shared her experiences as a practicing therapist providing counseling to BIPOC individuals and couples. Williamson utilized Relational Cultural Therapy as the framework for her counseling practice. She found it highly effective and would enjoy sharing with the Board members. • Beratta Gomillion – Executive Director of Center for Human Services. Gomillion shared that CHS recently redirected their focus to provide meaningful services through an ESJ directed lens, particularly incorporating the use of Trauma Informed Care and Restorative Practices. They’ve found it to be highly, and positively, impactful.
Crisis Care Centers Levy	<p>Dr. Matthew Goldman – BHRD Division Medical Director. Goldman presented a slide deck on the CCCL implementation plan and current planning efforts for the Crisis Centers Continuum of Care. See slide deck posted on the MIDD Advisory Committee website for the date July 25, 2024.</p> <p>Goldman shared:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The purpose of the Crisis Care Centers Levy (CCCL) is to establish and operate a regional network of five crisis care centers in King County – with at least one in each of the four crisis response zones, and one specifically serving youth. • In doing so, someone in crisis (or their caregivers) will have someone to call, someone to respond, somewhere safe to go, and someone to follow up. • Supporting goals of the CCCL are to restore the number of MH residential treatment beds and increase the sustainability of the Behavioral Health workforce. • The CCCL centers its work on ensuring equity in access and services, building on a quote from the AMA, “There is no Quality without Equity and there’s no Equity without Quality”. Equity efforts are dedicated to 1) Increase Access to Care for Clients, 2) Increase Access to Culturally and Linguistically Appropriate Services, 3) Increase the Representativeness of the BH Workforce, 4) Implement Accountability Mechanisms around Client Data Collection. • There is an emphasis on community engagement to ensure community responsiveness, and community members are encouraged to complete a survey or attend community engagement opportunities. BH Sales Tax Renewal Update	<p>MIDD Coordinator, Robin Pfohman, shared updates on the MIDD Behavioral Health Sales Tax renewal. As reported previously, two staff have been hired to coordinate renewal activities, Laura Smith and Natalia Chacon, with a third person to start in August.</p> <p>Current efforts focus on community engagement, which will guide development of an implementation plan to be presented to Council for their consideration of the sales tax renewal. Pfohman and Smith will</p>

	provide updates at future MIDD AC meetings on the themes and timing of the plan(s) and delivery schedule to King County Council.
MIDD Financial Report	Amanda Stephan, BFO for the MIDD sales tax, reviewed the MIDD Financial Plan for the period through 6/30/24. The Executive’s proposed budget will be submitted on August 23 rd , and two revenue updates, one in July and the other in August, will inform the final estimate for 2024-2025 Budget. Stephan anticipates the undesignated fund balance should be around \$15M at year’s end. Questions on these expenditures can be sent to Ryan Black or Scott Miller for review.
ACTION: DCHS Proposed MIDD 2025 Budget	<p>Robin Pfohman presented proposed changes to the 2025 budget.</p> <p>The 2025 budget is a one-year budget, as the County adjusts its biennium start date to begin with even years. As this one-year budget coincides with the end of MIDD 2, the budget is mostly status quo, and geared towards sustaining existing initiatives and extending certain projects launched in 2023-2024 so there’s no gap in services pending renewal of the behavioral health sales tax. Capital Improvements include funding for the Sobering Center, Cascade Hall, and other supplemental budget items.</p> <p>Members responded to a zoom poll: Do you approve the proposed 2025 budget? Yes, No, Undecided. The proposed budget was unanimously approved, which will be shared with the Executive’s office. Dwight Dively, Director of Performance, Strategy and Budget, King County Executive’s office is scheduled to attend the August MIDD AC to share the Executive’s 2025 proposed MIDD budget that they plan to submit to Council.</p>
