Issues	Discussion	Action Items
Welcome	Co-chair Steve Larsen, Deputy Director of King County Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention, began the meeting by greeting everyone, providing an overview of how to use Zoom features, and reviewing meeting logistics for members and other participants. Co-chair Larsen welcomed Susan McLaughlin, Division Director of the Behavioral Health and Recovery Division at King County. McLaughlin introduced herself and provided a brief overview of her background and experience in Behavioral Health, including previous roles with King County and community partners.	
Review/Approve Meeting Notes	Co-chair Larsen gave everyone a moment to review the October meeting notes. The meeting notes were approved by consensus.	
Public Comment	There was no public comment.	
MIDD Financial Report <i>Scott Miller, MIDD Business Finance Officer, DCHS</i>	Co-chair Larsen introduced Scott Miller, MIDD Business Finance Officer, to review the MIDD Financial Plan as of November 2023. Miller shared the following updates: <i>The November 2023 Financial Plan has been updated to reflect expenses posted through November 30, 2023, and the approved second omnibus budget supplemental.</i> <i>Inflation assumptions for future years have been updated increasing projected costs for our next budget cycle.</i> Miller showed an updated financial plan spreadsheet reflecting these changes to the budget. Miller also shared that the adopted budget for the 3 rd omnibus is final.

<p>Equity Focus and Analysis <i>Reflecting on Part I of Social (In)justice and Mental Health and Equity Work To-Date</i></p>	<p>Co-chair Larsen introduces Co-chair Laura Smith, Executive Director for Empower Youth Network. Co-chair Smith presented an overview of the goals of the equity focus and analysis section for today’s meeting, including a reflection on Part I of the book <i>Social (In)justice and Mental Health</i>, as well as a review of the MIDD AC’s equity work to-date.</p> <p>As part of her presentation, Co-chair Smith shared an Equity Timeline of the MIDD Advisory Committee, beginning with the introduction of the Equity Focus in October 2020 and including steps such as the Equity Framework Report in September 2021 and Behavioral Health Equity Training in May/June of 2022.</p> <p>Co-chair Smith also revisited the MIDD Advisory Committee Equity Framework 2023 Accomplishments and 2024 Opportunities. And the MIDD Advisory Committee Equity Definition.</p> <p>Before moving into breakout groups, Co-chair Smith requested that someone in each group take notes to share after the larger group comes back together.</p> <p>Group members were moved into breakout groups to answer the discussion questions:</p> <p>Questions: Related to the book</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Do you think this process will be useful to better integrate equity into MIDD 3 planning? • Are there actions you think we can be taking now? • How else has reading the book impacted how you work or think about race and social justice in your work/life? <p>Questions: Priorities for 2024</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • What are key priorities for next year? • What areas of the framework do you see we should now focus on? <p>Co-chair Smith asked members to post breakout group notes in the chat or email to Pfohman. Breakout group notes will be compiled and made available in the packet for the January 2024 meeting.</p> <p>After members were brought back from breakout groups, Co-chair Smith shared a proposed a reading schedule for discussion. Co-chair Smith also shared that they have been in touch with Sarah Vinson, M.D., one of the editors of the book, about the possibility of visiting Seattle in April. Co-chair Smith shared that the Steering Committee suggested focusing on the most relevant chapters of the book and reading and discussing two chapters at a time.</p>	

	<p>Pfohman clarified that this proposal would allow the group to move through the book more quickly and welcomed open reactions and discussion.</p> <p>A Menti Poll was presented with the questions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. How would you like to move forward with reading the book? 2. What do you see as our key priorities for 2024? <p>Pfohman asked for clarification on a specific response to the second question, “MIDD Advisory Committee briefing county council;” Pfohman asked if this was specific to what we’re learning in the book.</p> <p>Co-chair Larsen responded that in their breakout group, they discussed the possibility of being able to share information both about what we’ve learned through the book and the work that the committee is doing.</p> <p>Co-chair Smith suggested also sharing the MIDD Advisory Committee Equity Framework.</p> <p>Pfohman will share the results of the Menti poll with the next month’s meeting materials and with the Steering Committee.</p>	
<p>MIDD Community Behavioral Health Capacity Building <i>Robin Pfohman, MIDD Coordinator</i> <i>Nikki Nguyen, MIDD Community Partnership Program Manager</i></p>	<p>Co-chair Smith introduced Robin Pfohman, MIDD Coordinator, and Nikki Nguyen, MIDD Community Partnership Program Manager.</p> <p>Pfohman presented slides related to the MIDD Team’s efforts to move equity forward. Pfohman covered timeline, from the launching of the Community Driven Grants program, to hiring the Community Partnerships Program Manager, and to the establishment of the Community Owned Behavioral Health Collaborative in April 2023.</p> <p>Nguyen shared the goals and member agencies of the Community Owned Behavioral Health Collaborative (COBHC), a collaborative intended to provide capacity-building support to organizations, build a bridge to the publicly funded behavioral health system, and to reinforce MIDD’s focus on equity within our MIDD-funded programs. Nguyen also shared the current priorities, challenges, and needed supports of the member organizations in the collaborative.</p> <p>Nguyen then presented program accomplishments, including securing commitment to continue to fund past Community Driven (SI-01) grantees from the Community Behavioral Health Treatment (PRI-11) through 2025. Additionally, Nguyen presented a recommendation to the MIDD Advisory Committee to nominate one or two members from the COBHC to join the MIDD Advisory Committee in the currently vacant roles of Community and Consumer Ad Hoc Workgroup as the Collaborative is essentially an implementation what was outlined in the MIDD 2 Implementation Plan.</p>	

	Nguyen shared a future effort to partner with community-based providers to co-develop and implement community voice listening sessions within their own communities to improve understanding of behavioral health needs and assets.	
Updates	Co-chair Smith let members know that they should have received calendar invites for meetings in 2024. Co-chair Smith expressed, "Thank you for another great year of continued partnership for MIDD."
