Issues	Discussion	Action Items
Welcome	Co-chair Laura Smith, Executive Director for Empower Youth Network, began the meeting by greeting everyone and providing an overview of how to use Zoom features and reviewing meeting logistics for members and other participants.	
Review/Approve Meeting Notes	Co-chair Smith gave everyone a moment to review the June meeting notes. The meeting notes were approved by consensus.	
Public Comment	There was no public comment.	
Equity Focus <i>Mayor Lynne Robinson and Brad Finegood, MIDD Steering Committee</i>	<p>Mayor Lynne Robinson and Brad Finegood presented the third chapter of the book "Social Injustice and Mental Health." The difference between inequities and inequalities was discussed, and examples were shared from our community. The current movement of cultural determinism and culture talk in the mental health field were examined to reveal their harmful effects in perpetuating inequities. Members were brought to consider their privilege and positionality in the medical and mental health fields.</p> <p>Group members were moved into breakout groups to answer the discussion questions:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. <i>What are the times in my professional education or continuing education when equity issues were presented as cultural ones?</i> 2. <i>How can I be more intentional in my acknowledgment of privilege and positionality in medicine?</i> 3. <i>How can I transition to focusing on the how and why of mental health inequities rather than the what?</i> 	

	<p>After group members returned from breakout rooms, Jasmeet Singh, King County Behavioral Health Advisory Board, shared a personal experience related to considering positionality in making decisions with an equity mindset.</p> <p>Co-chair Smith prompted members to reach out to Robin Pfohman with suggestions and ideas on how the discussion and reading can influence our work with MIDD.</p>	
<p>MIDD Financial Report</p>	<p>Co-chair Steve Larsen, Deputy Director of King County Department of Adult and Juvenile Detention, welcomed Scott Miller, MIDD Finance Officer. Miller presented the August 2023 MIDD Financial Plan.</p> <p>The August 2023 Financial Plan reflects the August 2023 updated revenue forecast, adding \$1.1 million to estimated 23-24 biennial collections. The Executive’s Office is scheduled to complete their work on the Second Supplemental and transmit to Council on October 5. The Reserve for Second Supplemental of \$21.6 million has been moved to the 2023-2024 Estimated expense section.</p> <p><i>Finewood asked “Does that mean the reserve is going to be down to zero?” Miller explained that there is always a Rainy Day Reserve available, but there will be times when an additional reserve is called out.</i></p> <p><i>Council Member Sarah Perry verified that the 2023-2024 Rainy Day Reserve is estimated to end with \$16,959,233.</i></p> <p><i>Jasmeet Singh, King County Behavioral Health Advisory Board, asked if we have added to or taken from the Rainy Day Reserve in recent years</i></p> <p>Miller explained that when expenditures are less than revenue, the reserves increase; when expenditures exceed revenue, the reserves decrease. Miller further explained that the financial report is a planning document that is used to balance use of current funds with forecasted future funds and expenses. Miller highlighted increasing ending fund balances for recent years as the best proxy for cash-in-bank, out of which reserves are allocated.</p> <p>Miller offered to review the MIDD Financial Report in more detail outside of this meeting.</p>	
<p>Executive Proposed Second Omnibus MIDD Budget</p>	<p>Co-chair Larsen introduced Aaron Rubardt, Deputy Budget Director for Office of Strategy, Performance and Budget, King County. Rubardt presented changes made by the Executive Office to DCHS’s proposal previously shared at the July meeting.</p> <p>The Executive Office removed the following proposals:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Zero Suicide Program Implementation (PRI 06) • Multipronged Opioid Strategies Investments (CD 07) 	

	<p>The Executive Office added the following proposals:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Added Jail Health – MOUD Expansion (CD-07) - <u>\$535,000</u> • Jail Health – Coordinated Discharge (RR-06) - <u>\$681,000</u> • Superior Court – FIRS Staffing - <u>\$848,000</u> • District Court – Judicial Salary Increases - <u>\$22,000</u> <p>Co-chair Smith asked if Erin Carosa’s efforts with youth suicide was different from the Zero Suicide program.</p> <p>Pfohman replied that the Zero Suicide Initiative was being supported in part by MIDD funding, while there are also ARPA funds supporting suicide prevention.</p> <p>Rubardt clarified that the Zero Suicide Initiative was not moving forward in the executive proposed budget proposal. Co-chair Smith, Rubardt, and Pfohman agreed to review this change further.</p>	
<p>Briefing: Crisis Care Centers Levy</p>	<p>Kate Baber, Implementation Planning Director for Crisis Care Center, presented a briefing on the Crisis Care Centers Initiative. The Crisis Care Centers will be a regional network of care centers funded by the Crisis Care Levy. The Crisis Care Levy is the property tax levy that passed in April of this year by King County voters that implements a new property tax that will raise approximately \$1.1 billion of new revenue between 2024 and 2032.</p> <p>Baber discussed the clinical model of a crisis care center, the regional need for crisis care centers, and the timeline of implementation of this initiative.</p> <p><i>Co-chair Smith asked “Can somebody tell me how or why we lost the bed capacity?”</i></p> <p>Baber explained that bed capacity was lost due to a lack of resources to address capital maintenance issues and how the Crisis Care Levy will include funds to address these issues.</p> <p><i>Co-chair Larson expressed support for the emergency services drop-off areas of the Crisis Care Centers. Larsen asked “Does that assume then that the person being dropped off will go voluntarily, or is there an involuntary process as well?”</i></p> <p>Baber explained that Crisis Care Centers will operate within the current legal paradigms around involuntary care. At a Crisis Care Center, there will be a separate drop-off area for law enforcement that is easily accessible and staffed by trauma-informed personnel. Designated Crisis Responders will be available to make determinations regarding involuntary care, and individuals meeting criteria will be transported to appropriate facilities.</p> <p><i>Council Member Perry expressed gratitude and support for this initiative.</i></p>	

	<p><i>Laura Van Toss asked: "Will you be doing any research, any data collection or research in terms of how people are doing in these centers over time?"</i></p> <p>Baber responded that the implementation plan will have a performance and evaluation section, and there will be annual reporting to the King County Council. The results will also be shared publicly.</p>
