Issues	Discussion	Action Items:
Welcome	Co-chair Claudia D’Allegri welcomed all attendees and led introductions around the table and via phone. Co-chair Judge Laura Inveen reminded everyone that the meeting is being recorded and advised a public comment session would be held at the end of the meeting.	
Member/Staff Announcements	Christopher Verschuyl made an announcement about Behavioral Health Legislative Forum conference that will be held on November 18th, 2019 at Seattle Center.	
Review and Approve Meeting Notes	April 25, 2019 meeting notes were approved.	
MIDD Financial Report	Steve Andryszewski from the Department of Community and Human Services (DCHS) gave a briefing on the MIDD Financial Report. There was no change on the expenditures on the annual adopted budget. Revenue has changed. The March forecast went up by \$2.5 Million.	
Steering Committee Report	Mike Heinisch gave an overview on the 2018 MIDD Annual Report discussion at the Steering Committee. Suggestions were discussed during the meeting and were expected to be incorporated in the report.	
Briefing and Discussion: Draft 2018 MIDD Annual Report	Chris Verschuyl discussed the 2018 MIDD Annual Report draft and high level outcomes. He mentioned that comments made in the previous meeting are not reflected in this draft. As the report demonstrates, the long term emergency system use and crisis events outcomes were significantly reduced for MIDD service participants. Kimberly Cisson identified the client success stories sprinkled throughout the report. She talked about how the report focused on peer support services and touched on each initiative. She also pointed the strategy areas format that reflects the behavioral health continuum of care. Yvonne Roberts spoke about the MIDD goals which aim to strengthen the health and well-being of communities across King County. She also	

	<p>talked about the MIDD evaluation, and how it aligned with the five goals adopted by the King County Council for purpose of evaluation, performance measurement, and reporting. The primary focus of the MIDD’S evaluation activities is to determine the degree to which MIDD service participants show progress toward these goals. Similar approaches have been adopted for the Best Starts for Kids Levy and Veterans, Seniors and Human Services Levy.</p> <p>Comments: Jeff Sakuma suggested that language to identify the difference between the SBIRT in the Emergency Departments vs School-Based SBIRT be added.</p> <p>Councilmember Kohl-Wells suggested that the multiple race category have ethnicity added.</p> <p>Councilmember Asher suggested that the committee have an outcomes over time analysis to consider and better inform the committee’s recommendations in the future.</p>	Yvonne will check and see if that change would still be accurate based on the available data.

Initiative CD-07 Opioids Programming Update, including Upcoming Request for Proposal(RFP): Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT) for Shelters/Encampments	<p>Steve Gustaveson gave an update on initiative CD-07 Multipronged Opioid Strategies. He reviewed ongoing activities such as medicine return, distribution of naloxone kits, and opioid education.</p> <p>He also talked about new parts of the initiative, Medication-Assisted Treatment expansion. The task force recommended low-barrier access to buprenorphine for all people in need of services. Low-barrier modalities are close to where individuals are. This treatment will focus on providing treatment for people in encampments, shelters, and jails.</p>	
Upcoming RFP: Housing Outreach Partners (Initiative SI-03)	<p>Deb Srebnik gave a briefing on outreach treatment on demand. The treatment focus is on providing behavioral health outreach services for people experiencing homelessness. \$200,000 is going to the Services and Housing to Access Recovery Program (SHARP) program that was originally federally grant funding that began in late 2016. \$2.2 million is going to a Housing Outreach Partners RFP which will provide teams to both Seattle and King County Housing authorities’ buildings. Part of the budget will be used for performance incentives. This is a pilot with part of the funding being one time so working towards identifying sustainable funds will be part of the process.</p>
