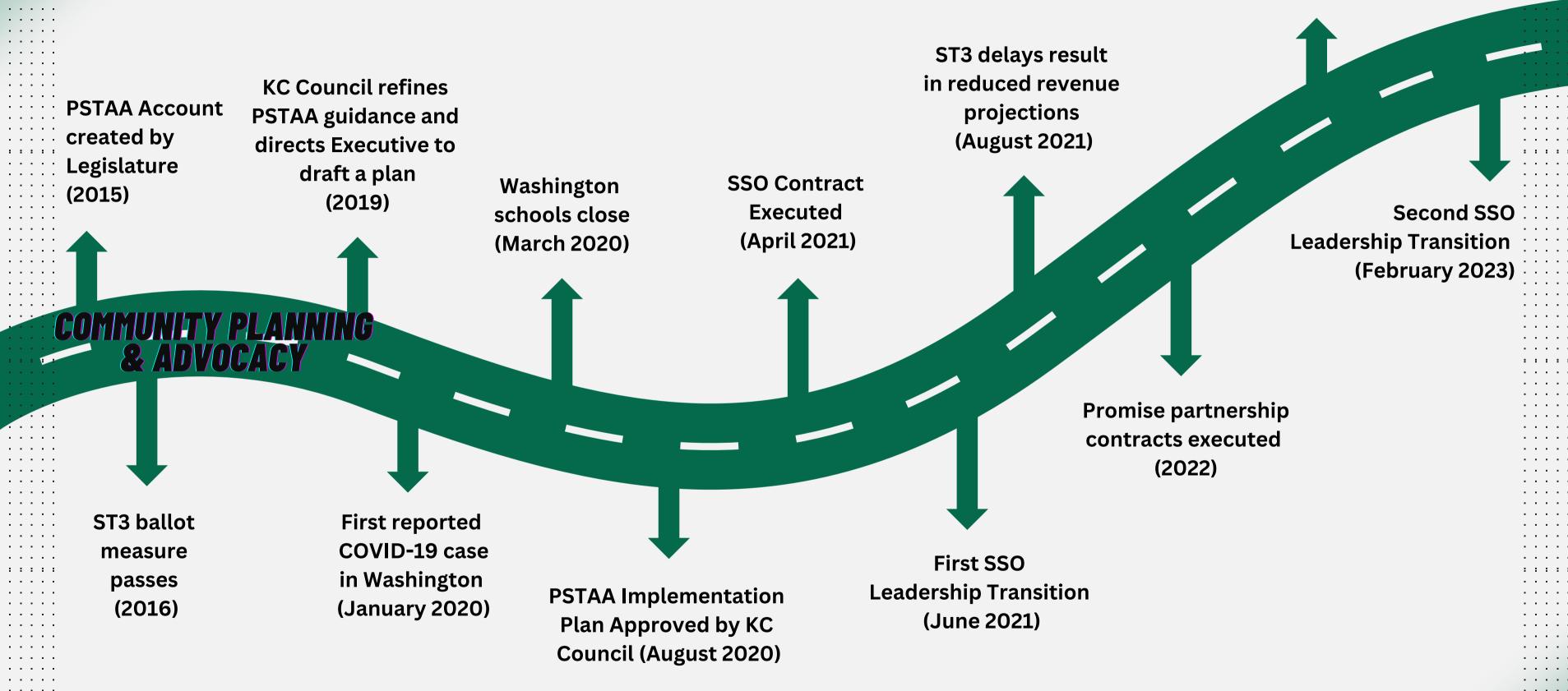


Equitable Postsecondary Access & Success for King County's Historically Underserved Young People

King County Promise (KCP) was envisioned to be a public-private partnership engaging King County K12 districts, Community Based Organizations (CBO), and Community and Technical Colleges (CTC) to develop a comprehensive student support model, supporting historically underserved young people to obtain postsecondary credentials.

KC schools fully resume in-person learning (September 2022)

Lead Continuous Improvement

- lead continuous improvement efforts
- facilitate shared learning with a focus on improving and increasing data access and use to inform improvement needs

Lead Program Implementation

- direct supports for KCP implementation
- professional learning, training, and resources
- consulting support for recruitment and hiring
- provide curriculum resources for funded and non-funded partners

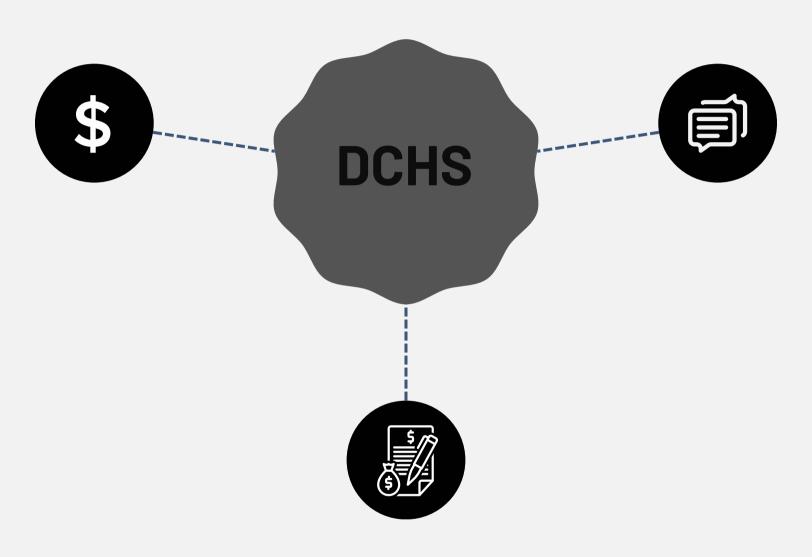
Lead Fundraising and Sustainability Planning

- in 5 years- raise at least \$5 million in matching funds from private and government sources
- oversee allocation of all matching funds into project

KING COUNTY DCHS-PSTAA

Lead Project Management & Oversight

- project manage and coordinate with internal & external stakeholders
- oversee performance measurement and evaluation
- oversee reporting and external communication aspects of the project
- maintain the project budget and oversee fiscal functions
- Inform CYAB of implementation progress, including facilitation of the PSTAA Advisory Subcommittee



Co-Develop and Co-Lead KCP Project with SSO

- implementation milestones and timeline
- system and program commitments
- RFP and contracts
- provide capacity building and technical assistance to funded partners, as needed

Lead Procurement & Contracts

- facilitate and lead all procurement efforts, including managing the contract development and compliance process
- execute and monitor all contracts that results from this strategy

KCP Implementation Phases

Phase 1

2021-2022

- Initial 2 Year Contracts (calendar years)
- Cohort 1- Invest in up to 4 Promise Partnerships (8-12 organizations, schools, colleges)
- Approx. \$9 million

Phase 2

2023-2025

- 3 Year Contracts (calendar years)
- Cohort 1- invited to scale their work.
- Cohort 2- Invest in up to 4 more Promise Partnerships
- Approx. \$11 million

Phase 1

2022-2024

- Initial 3 Year Contracts (school years 22-23, 23-24)
- Cohort 1- 2 Promise Partnerships (7 organizations, school district, colleges)
- Approx. \$3.2 million

Phase 2

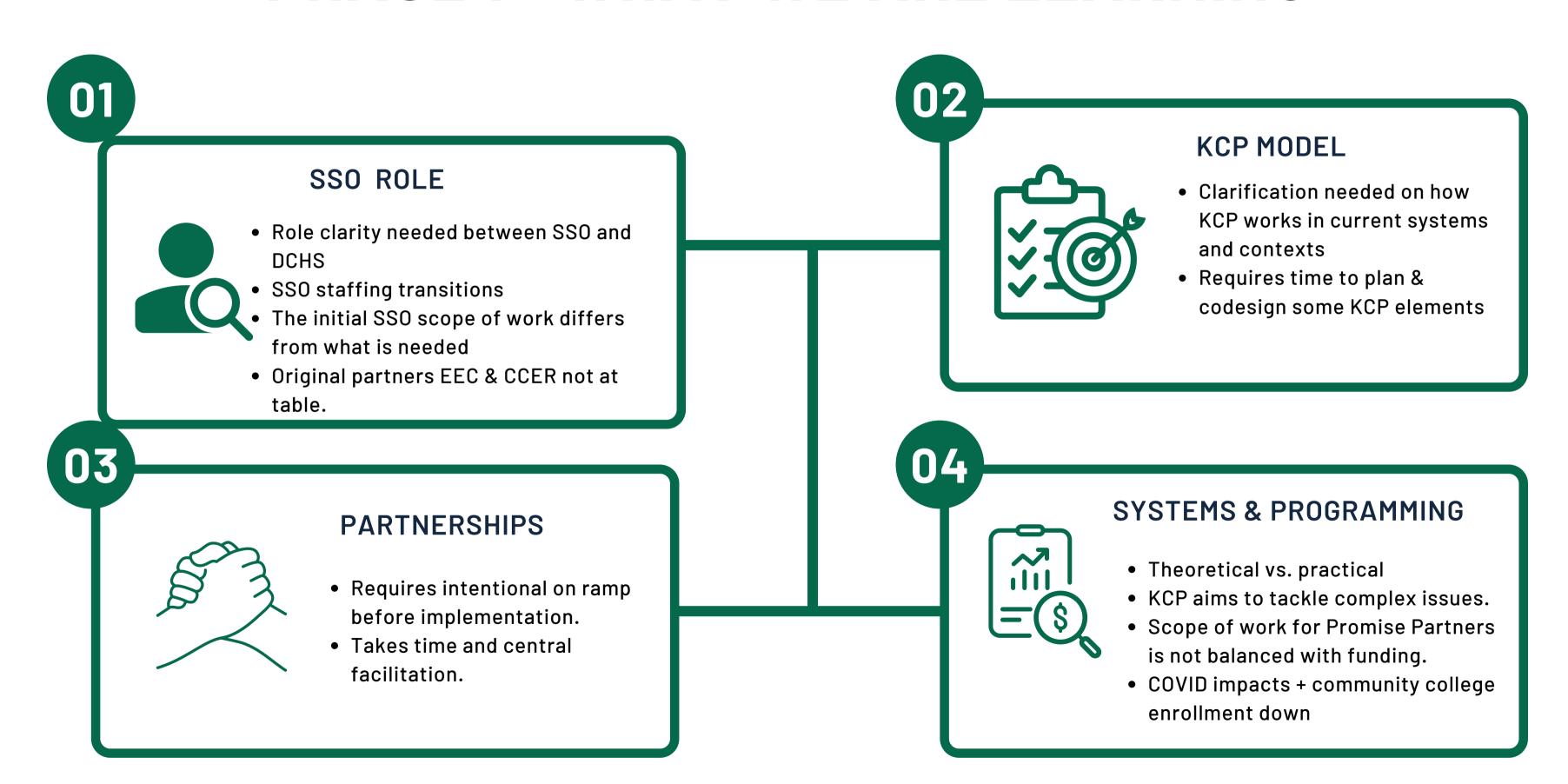
2024-2026

- 3 Year Contracts (school years 24-25, 25-26)
- Cohort 1- invited to continue their work (possible growth)
- Currently not enough funds for a Cohort 2
- Approx. \$4 million
