Dear Colleagues,

I want to speak directly to you about Reimagine DSHS and leadership decisions underway to strengthen our organization, support our teams, and ensure our programs remain strong and stable for the people who rely on them.

If you're not already familiar, Reimagine DSHS is a reorganizational effort rooted in a compelling purpose: to make it easier for Washingtonians to access the support they need, when and where they need it, and to improve customer experience. That purpose remains unchanged. The values that guided this work – service, innovation, and deep commitment to the people we assist – are still, and will remain, fundamental to who we are.

At the same time, as we've gone through the Reimagine process, various things have become clearer. We are operating within a complex, and at times inflexible, authorizing environment. Any internal changes—especially important, purpose-driven changes—must align with external expectations to avoid putting essential funding at risk. Federal funding rules, the national administration's perspective on our work, and our responsibility to anticipate and react to potential change remains top of mind. Additionally, our recently approved state operating budgets remained within their historic DSHS administrations.

Because of these realities, we must adjust some of the organizational changes envisioned last year. The first adjustment will be returning Development Disabilities to its own administration. I have asked Dana Phelps to serve as Interim Assistant Secretary and work closely with the Developmental Disabilities 24-7 and Community Services teams, as well as BHHA and HCLA Assistant Secretaries and their teams, to continue improving service delivery and avoid siloing. Additionally, Pablo Villareal will step in as Interim DVR Director. This approach preserves our funding, ensures compliance, and maintains continuity of services for the people and communities that depend on us.

We expect to complete adjustments by June 30, the end of the fiscal year. I imagine you might have questions about what this shift could mean in practice for you, the agency, our communities, and the people we are honored to serve. Please know I am committed to getting out—and taking in— as much information as possible. In the coming weeks, we will work closely with internal and external partners to identify next steps and prepare for the work ahead. Leadership and I look forward to sharing more detailed information in the coming weeks.

Meanwhile, the heart of Reimagine DSHS—and the work behind it—remains. The progress made to strengthen collaboration and coordination in agency areas that share similar functions has to move forward. We will continue these efforts and look for opportunities to create alignment with our agency's priorities on people, community, and results.

I want to express my sincere appreciation for everyone's continued dedication to DSHS and the people of Washington. We will keep communication lines open as we move through this transition together. Change is not easy but you and the people we serve are worth the effort. As always, I remain honored to call you my colleague.

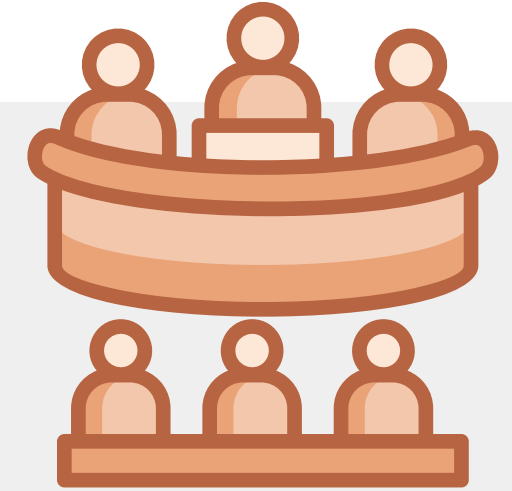
# Money challenges

Policy and money (but mostly money) drive legislative sessions



In 2026, they needed to align the operating budget to available revenue.

Debate over potential cuts & new revenue drove the session.



## REVENUE:

- Millionaires Tax (SB 6346) passed, but we won't see revenue until 2029.
- Local governments were granted more fund flexibility (HB 2442)
- Property tax relief expanded for people 62-plus on limited income (SB 6162)

## CUTS:

No change in eligibility for long-term care. But there were cuts across services, including IDD day services. These were less than first proposed.

## REJECTED:

- Cuts to early supports for infants and toddlers
- Removal of OT/PT/SLT for adults from Medicaid
- Cost shifting for school-based Medicaid

We may see more cuts in 2027- 28.

# The Millionaire's Tax applies to income over \$1 million

If you earn \$1,000,001 then just \$1 is subject to a 9.9% annual tax. (98 cents owed).

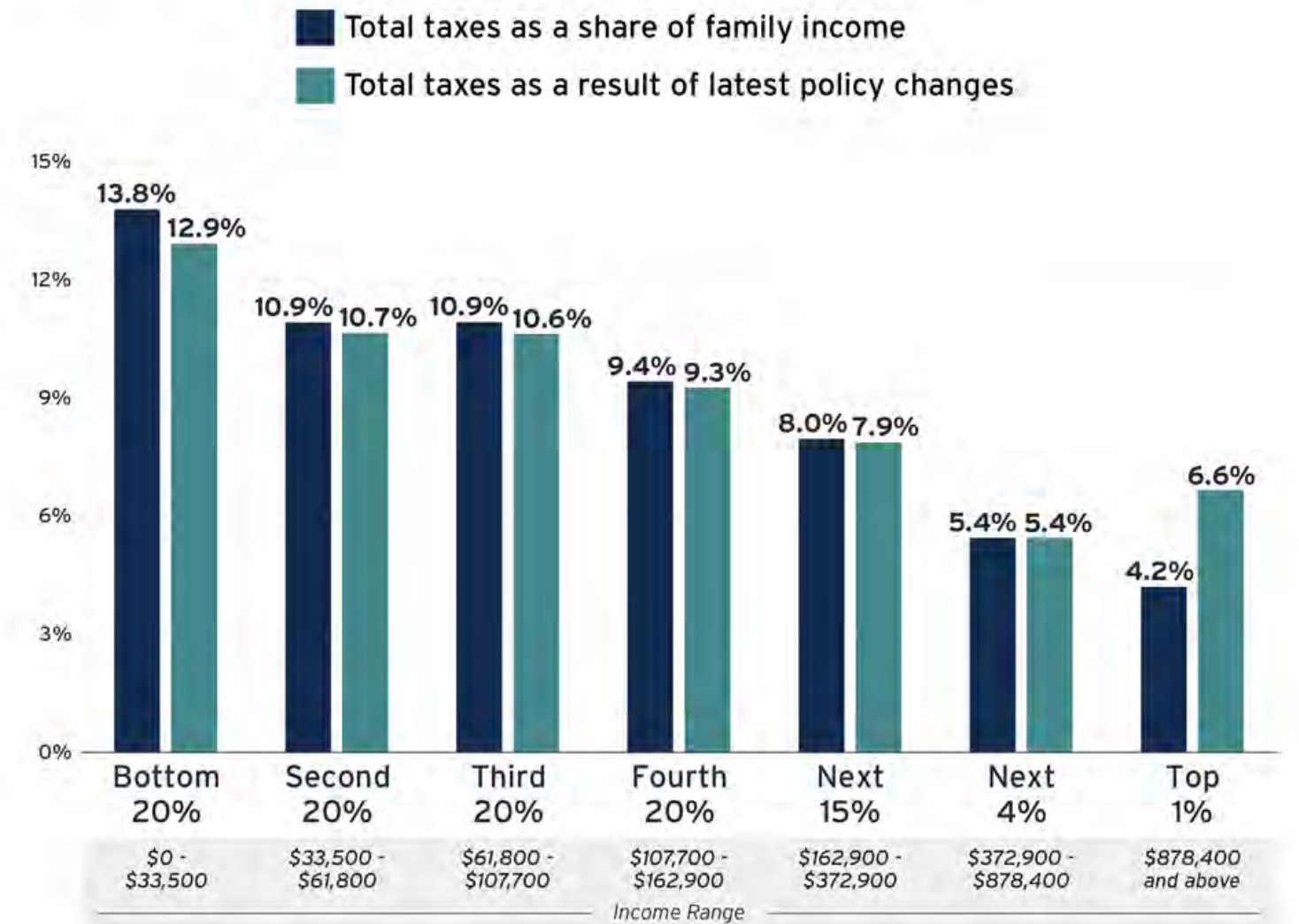
If you earn \$2 million, then \$1 million is subject to the tax (\$99,000 owed).

It is expected to raise up to \$3 billion.

## What it funds:

- Expanded Working Families Tax Credit
- Education, social and health services
- Will help offset federal cuts to SNAP & Medicaid
- Will balance out effects of federal tax cuts for the wealthiest (Average cut of \$90,000 for those making \$957,000 and above)

# Policy bills



It was a good year for bills that don't cost the state money.

- Saw some advances in special education policy and limits on use of restraint & isolation.
- The Community Protection Program will end.
- Historical documents from institutions will be available for study.
- More basic needs support and more housing options for disabled adults leaving foster care.
- Streamlining of oversight for community residential care

# The plan



\$250,000 was allocated for strategic planning to transform supports for people with IDD. Effort must transform support for people with IDD. Effort must:

- Prioritize collaboration between people with lived experience and decision-makers
- Identify strategies to reduce or eliminate the use of congregate institutional settings for long-term care
- Expand community based services to serve more people.
- Address barriers to access and equity
- Identify necessary investment in infrastructures, workforce and service capacity
