Title	Transitioning to Independent Living at Ages 18 and 50: An Extended Family's Journey
Description	There are many ways to transition from living at home to living independently. We will share our team's 15-year journey, to the present, of navigating different systems, needs, challenges, and our plans for the next 5 years and beyond.




