# Industrial Waste Fee Update: Council Action Paves the Way for New Fee System

**King County** 

## King County Council changes King County Code:

On December 10, 2018, the King County Council approved Ordinance 18851 that updates the King County Code. This is the first step leading to a new fee system for the King County Industrial Waste (KCIW) Program.

KCIW is <u>developing a new fee system</u> that will be based on the cost of providing services, be easier to implement and administer, and provide for more certainty for industry than the current system.

Changing the fee system involves three steps:

- 1. King County Council changes the King County Code.
- 2. Department of Natural Resources (DNRP) adopts a public rule.
- 3. The King County Wastewater Treatment Division (WTD) assigns fees and fee tiers.

From January 7 to February 28, 2019 KCIW customers and others will be invited to comment on the proposed public rule.

The code changes and proposed public rule outline a fee structure. They do not include specific fee amounts. Fee amounts would be updated over time as cost of service changes; the structure would remain. KCIW is sharing draft fee amounts to help customers understand the impacts of the proposed rule before they comment on it.

#### **Public Rule Process** January 7, 2019 Proposed public rule posted and comment period begins. February 5, 2019 Public hearing – details will be posted on the KCIW fee webpage at www.kingcounty.gov/industrialwaste in January. February 28, 2019 Comment period ends. After considering comments, DNRP Director makes any necessary revisions and signs March proposed public rule. It goes into effect 30 days later. **Fee Assignment Process** Late March WTD Director approves the 2019 dollar amount for each fee tier based on cost of service. April KCIW assigns facilities to fee tiers and explains how to appeal within 15 days. June KCIW sends bills reflecting new fees to local sewer agencies July New fees go into effect.
