1) Start of Meeting

The start of the meeting began at 5:20pm.

2) Welcome & Introductions

Warren Jimenez provided opening remarks and members of the Board and staff introduced themselves. Board member BrynDel Swift (District 4) resigned from the Board as she took the position as Chief of Staff for Councilmember Quinn's office (District 5).

3) Public Comment

There was no public comment.

4) Overview of the Parks Levy Oversight Board

The Parks Levy Oversight Board extends the tradition of civic oversight which continues from previous levies. There are 9 positions representing each county council district with the task to confirm spending is in line with what the voters approved. Specifically, the Board reviews the allocation of levy proceeds and progress on achieving the purposes of Ordinance 18890 and reports to the King County Executive, the King County Council and the regional policy committee annually. This is a distinct role which is not an auditing role, but rather to confirm spending is in line with what King County has committed itself to. To date the Board submitted its fourth report last October addressing 2023 levy dollars which included the themes of prioritizing funding to opportunity areas, equity in the regional trail system, equity in city distributions, and the demand for the Targeted Equity Grant program. The next report is due in November 2025.

5) Progress Towards Levy Commitments

Grayson Court provided an overview of the key performance indicators in the 2020-2025 Parks Levy. While the Board will be meeting to review/discuss the finances of the levy for 2024 specifically, staff will also share progress to date to better reflect the most current progress towards levy commitments.

Keep Parks and Trails Clean, Safe and Open

King County Parks conducts ongoing management of 205 parks, 175 miles of regional trails, 32,000 acres of open space, 250 miles of backcountry trails, and 150,000 acres of working forest and ecological conservation easements.

- 4 out of 5 infrastructure repair/replacement projects have been completed or in construction.
- 3 out of 6 play area rehabilitation projects have been completed or in construction.
- 5 out of 6 synthetic turf ballfield replacement projects have been completed (9 out of 11 ballfields have been replaced).
- 1 out of 4 grass ballfield rehabilitation projects have been completed (4 out of 8 ballfields have been repaired).
- 1 out of 3 trailhead access improvement projects have been completed or in construction.
- 7 out of 7 backcountry trails systems are currently being improved.

Improve Regional Trails and Mobility

- 9 of 11 King County regional trail connection projects have already been completed or are in construction.*
- 4 of 6 pass-through regional trail connection projects with partner cities have been completed or are in implementation.*
- 4 of 4 critical crossing projects are completed or in construction.

Make Parks and Recreation More Accessible

\$30,656,236 to the Woodland Park Zoo.

\$8,000,000 to the Seattle Aquarium.

\$55,608,127 to 39 towns and cities in King County.

8 projects have been completed at the Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center.

\$34,199,341 awarded for the Aquatic Facilities Grant Program (35 awards).

\$24,910,479 awarded for the Parks Capital and Open Space Grant Program (48 awards).

\$8,000,736 awarded for the Targeted Equity Grant Program (127 awards).

Grow and Connect Regional Open Space

3,398 acres of land from **188** aquisitions have been conserved to protect natural habitat and expand open space.

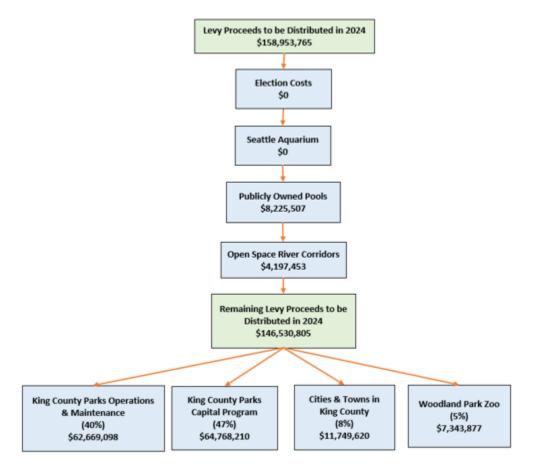
\$13,982,951 awarded for the Open Space - River Cooridor Grant Program (31 awards).

6) Parks Levy Financials

Jessica Carpenter provided an overview of the King County Parks' budget including elements that inform levy distributions through revenue forecasts received by the Office of Economic and Financial Analysis which determines how much money Parks can reasonably be expected to establish the total budget. The enacting ordinance's eligible expenditures guides how much money would be allocated to each program. When Council adopts the budget that creates the legal authority to spend the money and when levy proceeds come in they are then disbursed up to that legal authority. If there is a mismatch, then the amount that is disbursed may be different than planned. Staff also provided an overview of other funding sources that supplement the revenue received by the levy including car rental sales tax and real estate excise taxes (REET 1 and 2).

Total estimated revenues for 2020-2025 is \$847,103,324 which is reflective of the July 2025 forecast. King County received \$159,300,504 in levy revenue in 2024 and allocated funding in the following way:

A question was raised about the difference between total revenues collected and levy proceeds that were distributed in 2024. \$159,300,504 was the total revenue reported for 2024 and \$158,953,765 was the amount distributed in the same year. \$346,739 is the amount which was contributed to the fund balance and was not included in the levy proceeds that were distributed in 2024.

7) Approval of Past Minutes

Members discussed the minutes from the previous meeting on October 16, 2024. A comment was made that the 2023 distributions to the Woodland Park Zoological Society should be corrected in the minutes to reflect the correct amount compared to the annual report (\$6,803,9086). A motion was made to approve the minutes on October 16, 2024 as amended with the condition the levy distribution to the zoo was corrected. The motion was seconded. The Board voted in favor to approve the minutes as amended.

8) Levy Grants and Community Partnerships

Heidi Kandathil and Jessica Tissell provided an overview of the King County levy grants and Community Partnerships Grant program. Staff described how the agreements between community partners and King County Parks operate, including how partners provide capital investments and volunteer time to build new facilities or enhance current facilities. When capital projects are completed, the agreements may result in multi-year agreements that allow partners to contribute to operations, maintenance, and programming. There are currently 50+ projects which are council-directed (30%), focused on stewardship (24%), part of major maintenance activities (4%), or are in different stages of planning, design, or construction (42%). 34 of the projects are currently in the operations phase and 17 projects are in development. The program contributed roughly \$7 million between 2020 and the third quarter of 2025 to community organizations.

Staff provided an overview of the levy grants which includes:

- Aquatic Facilities
- Parks Capital and Open Space
- Open Space-River Corridors
- Targeted Equity

Staff provided an overview of levy grant reimbursements, applications vs. awards, awards by organization type, awards by project type, examples of past awards, and a snapshot of current award status for the different programs. A question was raised about the amount of levy funding committed to projects but not yet reimbursed resulting in outstanding levy proceeds not yet spent. Discussion ensued.

Staff provided an overview of 2024 program expenditures for both the levy grants and the Community Partnerships and Grants program.

8) Operations & Maintenance

The King County Parks system includes 205 parks, 175 miles of regional trails, 32,000 acres of open space, 250 miles of backcountry trails and 150,000 acres of conservation easements. Overall, operations and maintenance can be summed up by 4 important goals: 1) take care of what we have, 2) keep parks

and trails clean, safe, and open, 3) steward regional open space and natural areas, and 4) maintain regional and local parks.

Maintenance and operations includes a number of different teams and programs, including: 10 parks district crews, 2 regional trail crews (north and south), backcountry trail crews, crafts crew, heavy equipment crew, vegetation management crew, arborist, cultural resources program, playground program, a restoration program, jobs program, and parks patrol.

In order to keep parks and trails clean, safe and open staff respond in a number of different ways, such as routine maintenance, reactive (e.g. weather events), major maintenance, and preventative maintenance. Staff provided an overview of the drivers that direct the work of the Operations section as well as how staff incorporate equity into decision-making. A question was raised about resource management across the system and tracking the types of investment and tasks by parks. Discussion ensued.

Staff provided a summary of 2024 revenues and expenditures for maintenance and operations.

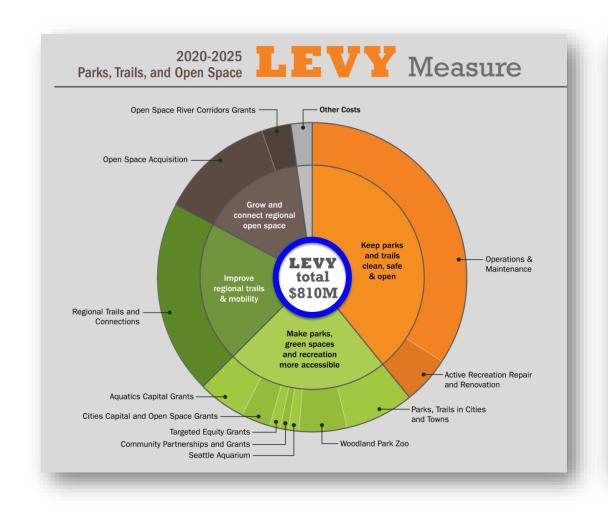


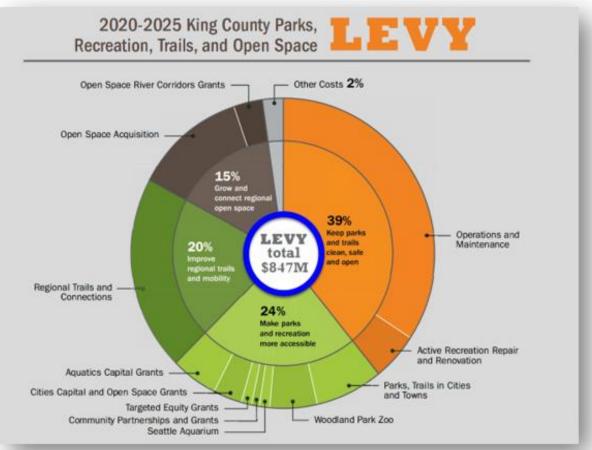
OVERVIEW OF KING COUNTY PARKS 2020-2025 LEVY PROCEEDS & ESTIMATED REVENUES

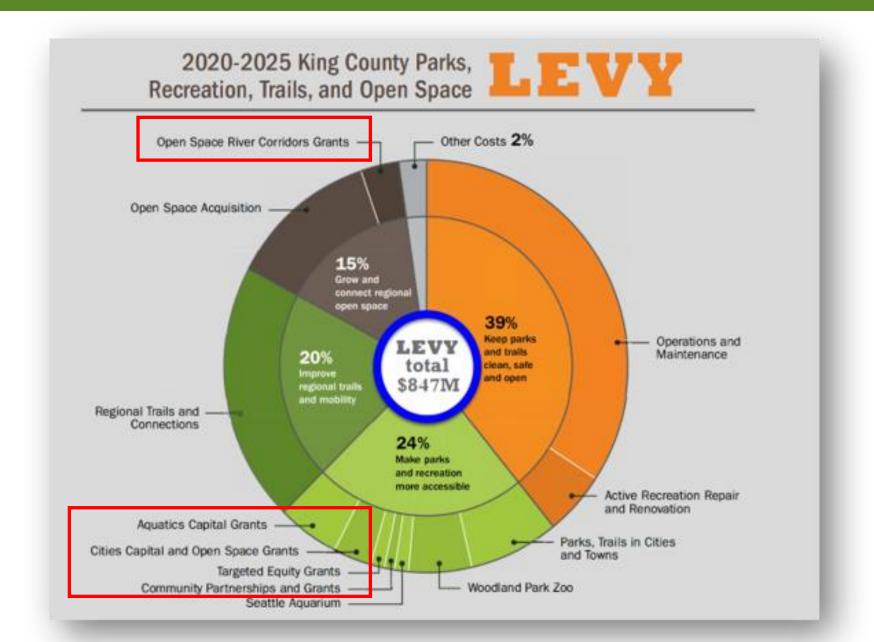

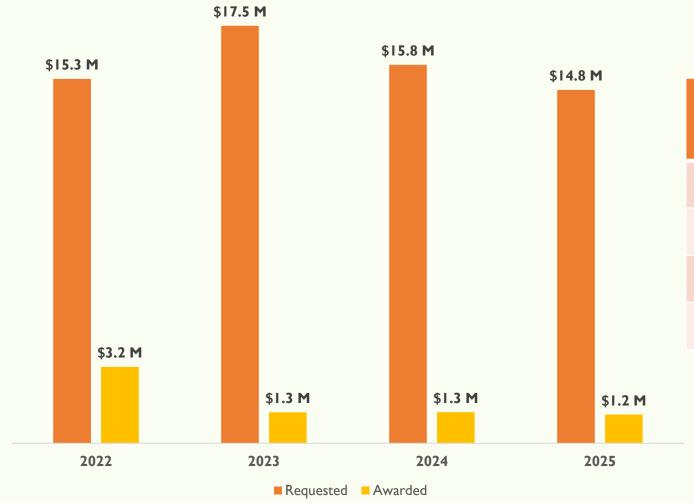

- 1. Business Revenues include a variety of user fees and entrepreneurial efforts to support the park system and reduce the burden on taxpavers.
- 2. Levy Administration Fee, authorized by section E.5 of ordinance #18890, reflects the total amount retained by King County Parks for the costs of managing and administering the levy.
- 3. Interest Earnings and Other Miscellaneous Revenue includes interest earnings on fund balance from the King County investment pool, private timber harvest excise tax, and delinquent levy proceeds from the 2008-2013 Parks Operating Levy.
- 4. Continuing from the 2014-2019 Parks Levy, King County provides the Washington State University Cooperative Extension annual funding to support the 4-H Youth Development Program. The initial contribution was \$100,000/year, on a reimbursement basis. The 2023-2024 adopted budget increased this contribution by an additional \$51,000/year through 2025.
- 5. King County provides annual funding to King County Search and Rescue to support operations and headquarters maintenance, as directed by a budget proviso in King County Ordinance 18993. The 2023-2024 adopted budget increased this contribution by an additional \$100,000/year through 2025.
- 6. King County requires operating funds that are primarily funded through property taxes to hold in reserve the equivalent of three months of budgeted expenditure. This is intended to stabilize the fund's cash balance from dipping below zero before the property tax payments are made in April, in compliance with the county's financial policies laid out in King County Motion 13764.
- 7. Targeted Equity Grants Carry Forward reserves funding for the Targeted Equity Grants program that was not spent in 2024. Funds carry forward to be spent in the 2025.
