#### 1) Start of Meeting

The start of the meeting began at 5:00pm.

#### 2) Welcome

Members of the Board and staff introduced themselves.

#### 3) Public Comment

There was no public comment.

### 4) Approval of Past Minutes

Members discussed the minutes from the previous meeting on September 10, 2025. A motion was made to approve the minutes. The motion was seconded. A request was made to amend the minutes related to a typo, including others that will be shared later. The Board voted in favor to approve the minutes as amended.

#### 5) Woodland Park Zoo

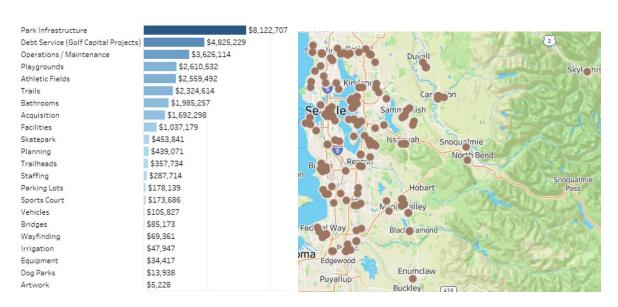
Staff presented on the 2024 levy distributions to the Woodland Park Zoo which totaled \$7,324,657 (includes a 0.5% levy administration contribution of \$36,624). The zoo will attend the upcoming meeting for their presentation on how levy funds were used.

#### 6) Cities and Towns in King County

Staff described how levy funding can be used by towns and cities in King County. Direct pass-through levy funds distributed to towns and cities from the King County Parks Levy can be used for parks system operations and capital improvement projects within a town or city's parks system. The "parks system" refers to any building or other structure related to parks or recreation, park areas, trails, open space, natural areas, resource or ecological lands, and other parks or recreation property owned or otherwise

under the jurisdiction of the town or city. The criteria for eligible expenditures is broad and flexible in order for towns/cities to best serve their local communities, meet the specific needs of their constituents, and improve natural areas unique to their parks systems. Expenditures that would traditionally fall under a park maintenance/operations budget or a dedicated budget for a parks capital improvement program are considered good candidates for levy-funded projects and activities. Other types of expenditures which support parks system operations and capital improvement projects could also be considered eligible as long as the expenses support parks-related projects/activities. This includes but is not limited to salary/benefits for new personnel, vehicles for parks operations, and equipment for parks employees. Towns and cities can carry forward unused levy funds from the King County Parks Levy to the next year to accumulate funds for future planned projects and/or activities.

Staff presented data on how/where cities are using levy funding as well as major milestones reported for 2024.

### 7) King County Parks Capital Improvement Program

Levy Allocations and Expenditures

Staff provided an overview of 2024 levy budgets and expenditures in the Capital Improvement Program. Members discussed levy funding for the Community Partnerships and Grants program that was presented at the previous meeting.

### Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center

Staff provided an overview of the construction activities over the levy period:

- Already Completed
  - Replace the existing large skylights in the main pool area
  - o Pool deck and dive pool resurfacing
  - Elevator modernization
  - Diving platform repairs
  - Natatorium lighting replacement (Phase 1)
  - o Recreation pool HVAC replacement
  - Natatorium lighting replacement (Phase 2)
  - Control Room Network Upgrades
  - Emergency Repairs to PoolPaks & Filtration System
- In Construction
  - o Banquet hall roof replacement (Estimated Completion Oct)
  - Event replay camera system (restarted with new funds in 2025)
- Priorities to be re-evaluated as part of next levy
  - Fire security system upgrades (started but put on hold)
  - Recoating/painting throughout the facility
  - o Parking lot improvements including new street reader board

#### Open Space Acquisition & Land Conservation

Parks levy funding for open space acquisition/land conservation includes the acquisition, conservation, and stewardship by King County of additional open space lands, natural areas, resource or ecological lands, rights of way for regional trails, and urban green spaces. At a high level, these projects include King County open spaces, open spaces for towns and cities, stewardship of lands acquired (operations and maintenance), and water access acquisition on Lake Washington. Parks levy funding for open space, natural lands and urban green space acquisition is intended to be used by King County solely for land acquisition and can be used to acquire land for the following purposes:

- Passive recreational uses (e.g. hiking, mountain biking, bird-watching, etc.)
- Regional trails
- Open space lands except if the land is primarily an agricultural use

The Parks Division prioritizes acquisitions based on several factors. The Land Conservation Initiative (LCI) directs the Department of Natural Resources and Parks (DNRP) to prioritize land use categories and equitable access, which includes urban greenspace, trails, natural lands, rivers, forests, and farmland. The work also complements the Water and Land Resource Division's (WLRD) Basin Stewards, who focus on ecological conservation driven largely by salmon recovery goals. Parks uses additional criteria to prioritize land acquisitions, such as whether the acquisition grows the parks system in a strategic way, if Parks can efficiently manage and take care of the property, and if acquisitions advance equitable distribution of greenspace. Parks also responds to community inquiries in the evaluation and purchase of land parcels.

When purchasing lands, the Division's funding requests are evaluated by the Conservation Futures Advisory Committee. This group is tasked with reviewing applications for Conservation Futures Tax (CFT) funds that are dedicated to acquiring lands with ecological and passive recreation benefit. The King County Conservation Futures Advisory Committee is a volunteer advisory board serving King County government which is comprised of 16 members who serve 4-year terms:

- 9 Council district representatives nominated by King County Councilmembers
- 4 Council at-large representative positions nominated by the Council Chair
- 3 at-large representative positions nominated and appointed by the King County Executive.

CFT funds are available to King County, cities, and certain non-profits, but typically require a dollar-for-dollar match. King County's matching funding source is usually Parks Levy open space acquisition funds. Therefore, in conjunction with the CFT annual allocation recommendation process, the committee also makes an annual recommendation for this bucket of King County Parks Levy funds. The committee recommends the allocation of CFT and Parks Levy funds to the King County Executive and Council, and the Council ultimately approves the final funding awards through their annual budget process.

Staff also described open space acquisitions in "opportunity areas" where the requirement for matching funds can be waived for the purchase of a property. An opportunity area is defined as one that lacks access to public greenspace and has poor health outcomes and lower household incomes. Opportunity areas have been mapped, and projects in these locations are automatically qualified for a match waiver. Project proponents can also use discretionary criteria to demonstrate need if a project is not located in an opportunity area. Match waivers are intended to help "eliminate disparities in access to public open spaces and trails in communities with the greatest and most acute needs" and support the equity focus of the King County Land Conservation Initiative.

As a result, levy funds that would have been traditionally used to match CFT funds to purchase property could be waived if the land acquisition created new open space in an opportunity area (i.e., CFT funding could pay 100% of the eligible project acquisition costs rather than 75%). Funding that would have traditionally been used for the 75% match can then be used to purchase other properties to conserve more open space using proceeds from the 2020-2025 King County Parks, Recreation, Trails and Open Space Levy. Since the start of the 2020-2025 parks levy, King County has made 8 acquisitions in opportunity areas (cities have made many others):

- Glendale Forest: 4.68 acres (2020)
- Glendale Forest: 0.15 acres (2021)
- Dick Thurnau: 0.46 acres (2022)
- Skyway Park: 3.57 acres (2022)
- Lakeland North Park: 22.07 acres (2023)
- Hamm Creek Natural Area: 2.01 acres (2023)
- West Skyway: 3.2 acres (2023)
- Skyway Farms: 0.15 acres (2023)

Staff noted that since the start of the levy over 3,400 acres of land have already been conserved.

Staff reported the 2024 levy budget and expenditures for open space acquisitions.

Regional & Public Trails System

The goals of regional trails and connections are to improve and connect regional trails, increase mobility, ensure that essential connections are completed, maintain existing trails, and expand and connect regional and public trails. The original levy deliverables included design or construct 16 regional trail connections and 4 critical crossings.

#### 17 regional trail connections

At this time of the levy there are currently 17 regional trail connection projects due to some projects being reclassified as well as new interlocal agreements with cities that were not previously anticipated.

Staff reported on the progress of the regional trail connection projects:

#### Levy allocations

Staff reported on the 2024 levy budgets and expenditures for the regional and other public trails system.

#### King County Parks Repair and Renovation

The 2020-2025 King County Parks, Recreation, Trails and Open Space Levy funds a number of projects to repair and renovate existing facilities and infrastructure within properties owned by King County Parks. The original levy commitments included:

- Improve parking at 3 trailheads
- Rehabilitate 3 grass ballfields
- Backcountry trail rehabilitation at 5+ sites
- Repair or replace facilities at 6 sites (includes Weyerhaeuser King County Aquatic Center)
- Replace 11 turf ballfields
- Rehabilitate 6 play areas

Staff explained the projects for play area rehabilitation and ballfield turf replacement are based on the life-cycle schedule and routine inspections from Parks staff. Synthetic turf fields typically have a 12-year life cycle and are prioritized accordingly for replacement. Play areas are routinely inspected by Parks' certified playground specialist and are prioritized accordingly for replacement at the end of their life cycle. The sport court/grass ballfield rehabilitation and backcountry trail rehabilitation needs are based on reports and assessments from Parks operations staff and park users, as well as recent capital project requests that weren't able to be funded in the current levy period. Trailhead improvements are based on recent acquisitions and user demand for trail access.

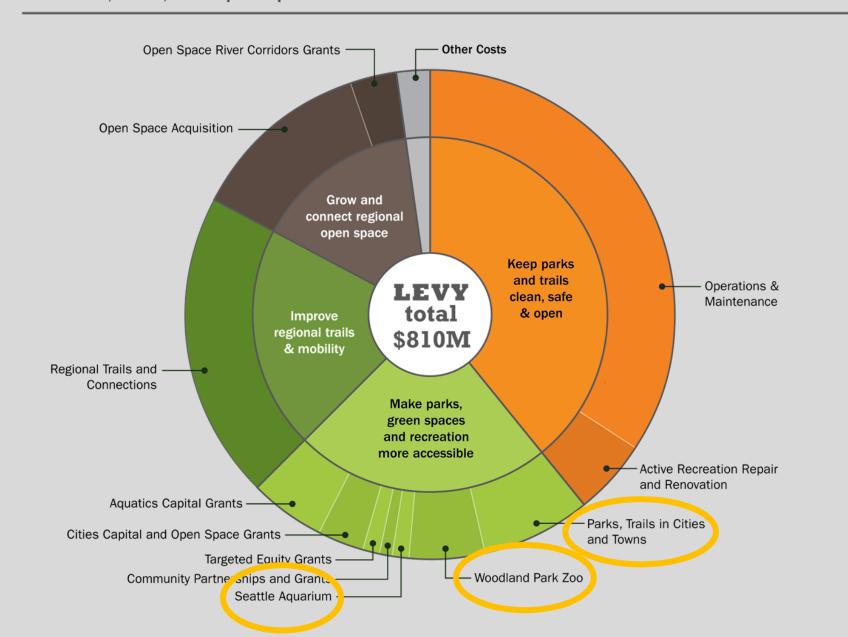

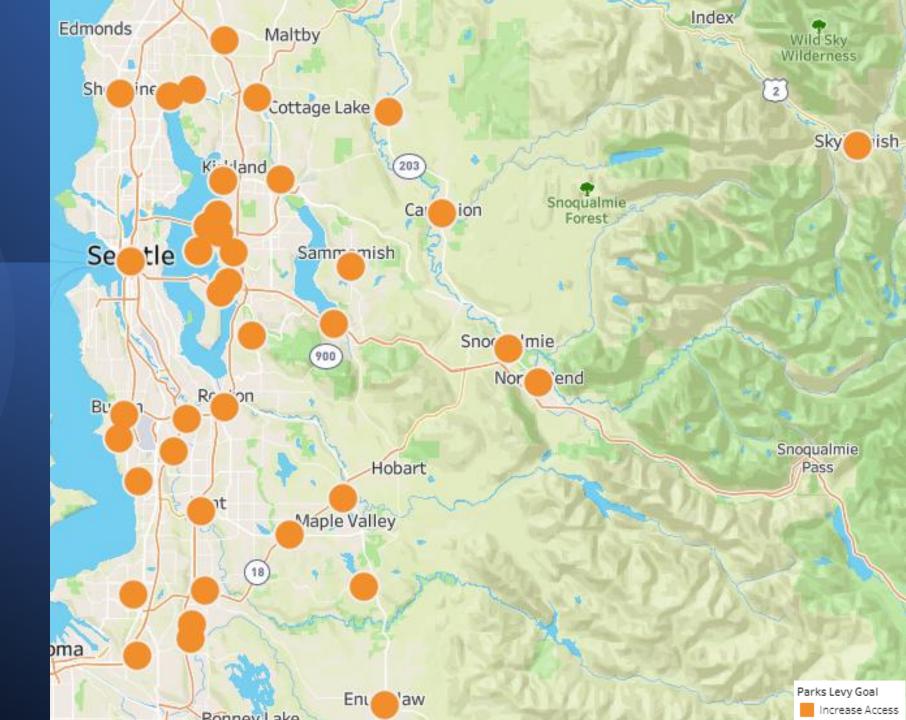

Cities & Towns in King County

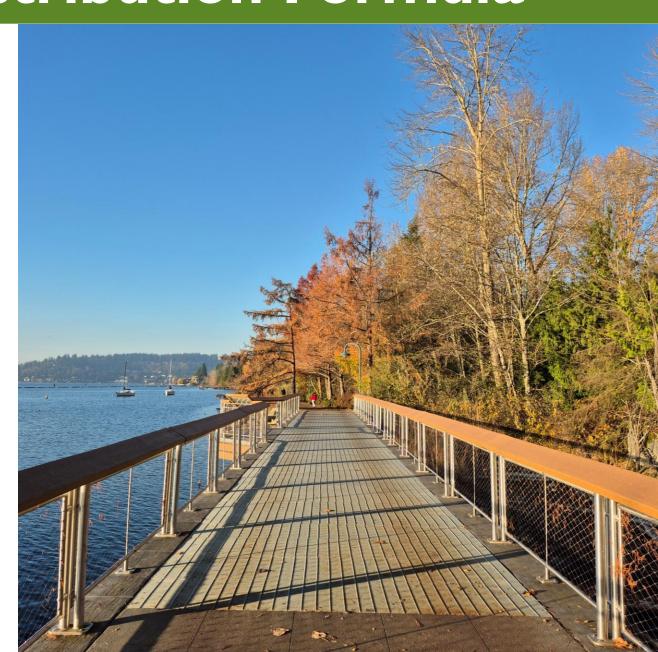

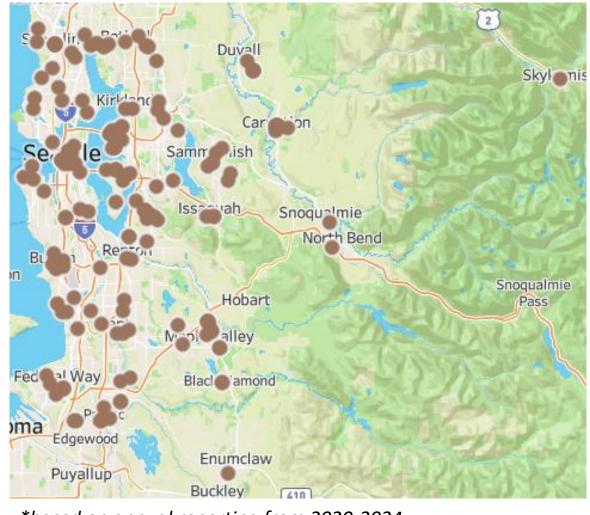

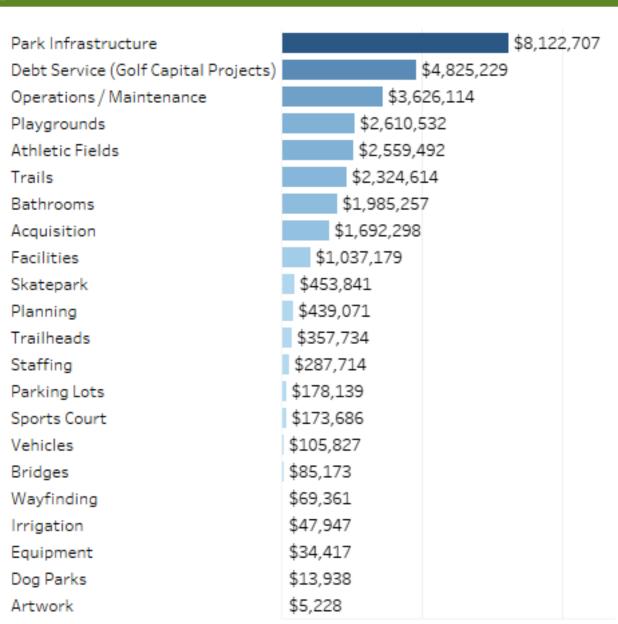


### How Are Cities Using Levy Funds?
