Overview

Enumclaw Recycling and Transfer Station was constructed in 1993 on 25 acres located at the south border of the closed Enumclaw Landfill. The station consists of a 40,000 square foot enclosed transfer building with waste compaction equipment, a scalehouse, a recyclable materials collection area with a 10,000 square foot roof canopy, and a public restroom. The station primarily serves residents and businesses from the Black Diamond, Enumclaw, and Maple Valley areas.

Vehicle length limits

40 feet. Max combined length limit for vehicles and trailers from bumper to bumper.

What happens to the waste?

The waste is transported by county employees in covered trailers from Enumclaw to the Cedar Hills Regional Landfill, 21 miles away.

What happens to recyclable materials?

Recyclable materials are separated by type and distributed to local, national or international markets for processing into recycled content products. Only materials that are empty, clean and dry when collected are acceptable for recycling. Textiles are donated to local non-profits.

Notable features

- The building was designed to sustain 90 mph winds.
- Funded by the 1% for Art Program and designed by artists Thompson Brennan and James Pridgeon, an entry gate and sculptural installation entitled "Elemental Cycle" recognizes the history of the local community and reinforces the act of recycling through the artists' use of discarded items from local industry.
- Compactors for cardboard and for commingled recyclable materials reduce the number of truck trips to a recycling facility, lowering carbon emissions and transportation costs.

Bins are color-coded – green for cardboard, blue for scrap metal, and orange for clean wood – so customers can sort out recyclable materials.

2021 at a glance

Who are the customers?

99 percent of visits were made by self-haul customers who contributed 60 percent of the total solid waste received at the station. Commercial customers contributed 40 percent of the total solid waste with 1 percent of the visits.

Tons of solid waste disposed

23,831. This constitutes 3 percent of solid waste at all King County transfer stations.

Recycling services

- Appliances
- Cardboard*
- Mercury-containing light bulbs and tubes
- Scrap metal*
- Textiles
- Wood (clean, untreated)*
- Yard waste*
- The following can be combined in the large blue “Recyclable Materials” containers, must be empty, clean and dry:
 - Paper, including office paper, junk mail, envelopes, newspapers, magazines, catalogs, paper food boxes, cartons such as milk, juice and broth cartons, paper cups if securely tied in clear plastic bags, and hard and paperback books
 - Cans (aluminum, tin, steel)
 - Glass bottles and jars
 - Plastic bottles, cups, jugs, tubs, pots, food containers, clamshells, trays
 - Lids (3 inches or more)

* These materials must be recycled at facilities that accept these materials for recycling.
