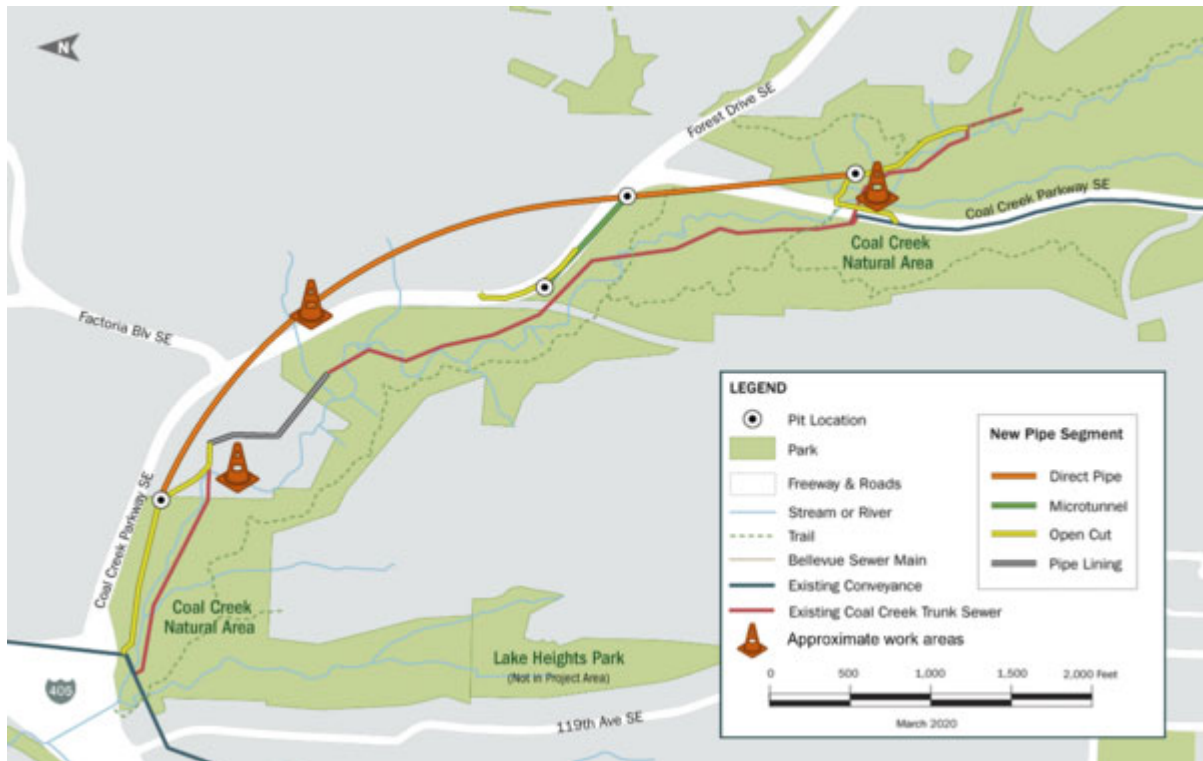

Upcoming tree surveys in the project area; opportunity to give input on trailhead restoration continues

The Coal Creek Sewer Upgrade Project team is continuing field work to inform project design. Beginning August 11, crews will be carrying out tree surveys. Keep up to date as the project team works to complete the final design for this project.

You still have time to give input on ideas for improving trailhead accessibility. If you have been too busy to participate, continue reading to find all the ways you can get information, contact us to discuss, and get your ideas and voice heard.



Tree surveys starting August 11

King County’s Coal Creek Sewer Upgrade Project is in final design. Beginning August 11, crews will survey selected trees in the project area. Surveyors will identify tree types and document tree locations. This information is used in project design and plans for either tree protection or replacement.

Tree surveys will occur at the Red Cedar Trailhead, on the hillside near Newport Covenant Church, and on 125th Ave Southeast (map above). **Some surveys will take place on private property. King County’s property team is coordinating access with property owners in advance of work starting.**

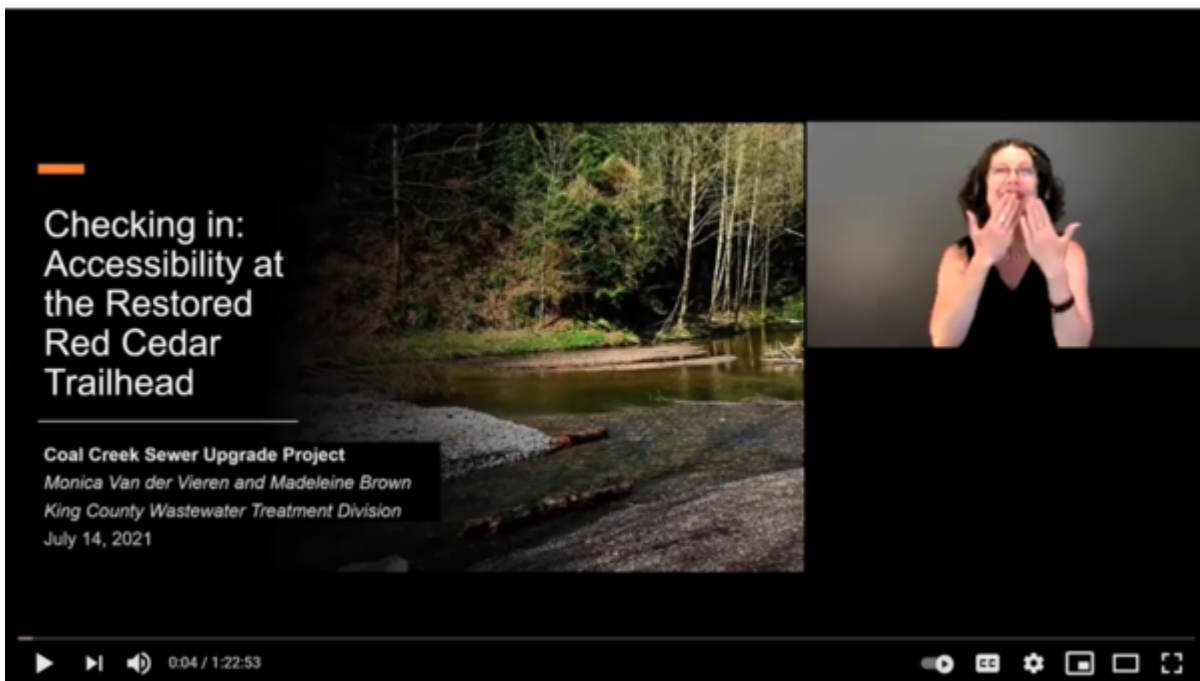
What to expect

- Work is expected to begin Wednesday, August 11 and will last approximately one day.
- Planned work hours are from 8 am to 3 pm.
- Trail users may see crews working in the Coal Creek Natural Area. Crews will follow current social distancing practices.
- Crews may remove small amounts of vegetation for access, where needed.
- **No trail closures are anticipated for this work.**

The project team hosted an online public meeting on July 14 about changes at the Red Cedar Trailhead that can increase accessibility for people living with disabilities. Signage, seating, maps, guides, and interactive content are all ideas that we have thought of that can help people plan and enjoy outdoor trips that are appropriate for them.
