## Geotechnical investigations starting Monday, November 17

Expect temporary lane closures, parking restrictions and pedestrian detours

King County Wastewater Treatment Division is considering locations to build the Georgetown Wet Weather Treatment Station. This station will clean sewage and stormwater before returning it to the Duwamish River. To help inform the project, we will conduct investigations in your neighborhood to evaluate soil and groundwater conditions. We expect the investigations to start as early as Monday, November 17, and last about three weeks (approximately two days at each location).

Crews will drill holes in ten locations along South Michigan Street, East Marginal Way, 4th Avenue South, 1st Avenue South, South Findlay Way and South Brandon Street. A truck-mounted drill rig will drill each hole to about 20 feet below the surface. Soil samples will be removed to allow us to analyze soil conditions.



### What to expect:

- Work hours typically between 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.
- Work for about three weeks starting Monday, November 17.
- Work will occur within public right-of-way, potentially includes on-street parking areas, planting strips, sidewalks, and/or the roadway depending on features of each specific site.
- Temporary parking restrictions, shoulder, sidewalk and/or lane closures, and pedestrian detours. Flaggers will direct traffic through the work site if work in the roadway is required.
- Noise close to the work area.
- When the work is complete, the site will be restored according to City of Seattle standards.
