King County to replace regional sewer pipelines in Redmond

Reliable sewer service is the cornerstone of healthy communities and a healthy environment.

King County Wastewater Treatment Division (WTD) has collected and treated wastewater for 50 years – half a century! Wherever you live, work, socialize, or recreate in Redmond, the water you use takes a journey down your drain, travels through your pipes, the local sewer system, and finally, through the County's pipes to an award-winning treatment plant.

After decades of service, it's time for the County's pipes to be replaced. While this project may mean temporary construction inconveniences, the new sewer will serve your community for the next 50 to 60 years.

In early 2016, WTD's team will present a proposed sewer pipe alignment and project design will begin. Design, including environmental review and permitting, will continue through 2017. Construction is expected to begin in 2018 and be completed

in 2021.

The map on page 2 shows the route for the new Lake Hills/ Northwest Lake Sammamish sewer line. The new pipeline is in the same location as the old pipeline for most of the route. The project team was able to move the alignment in some locations to reduce impacts to people and the environment. However, complicated wastewater flows and area development limited where the pipeline could be located. King County's team will be working closely with neighbors and groups all along the alignment to provide information, answer questions, and address concerns.

> The Lake Hills/Northwest Lake Sammamish sewer line receives wastewater from homes, businesses, schools, and other organizations in an area of almost 5,000 square acres in Redmond. The water you use travels down your drains to the City of Redmond's sewer system. The City of Redmond's pipes send the wastewater to King County's system, where it is carried to the **Brightwater Treatment** Plant in Woodinville for treatment.
