Field investigation update

King County's team will continue field work and geotechnical borings in Redmond through August. You may see crews wearing bright safety vests and using metal rods to do field work near King County's Marymoor Park entrance and near the Sammamish River Trail from Marymoor Park to NE 85th Street by Redmond City Hall.

On July 25 and 26, crews will complete geotechnical borings on NE 24th Street and 177th Avenue NE. To complete this work, crews will close a portion of the east sidewalk on 177th Avenue NE at the intersection of 177th Avenue and West Lake Sammamish Parkway and reduce NE 24th Street near 179th Avenue NE to one lane. Drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists may see cones, signage, construction equipment, and flaggers.

From July 26 to 29, crews will complete four geotechnical borings near the Sammamish River Trail in King County's Marymoor Park to evaluate soil and groundwater conditions. No borings will be completed on the trail itself, but trail users may see the trail narrowed at times when equipment is moved down the trail. Moving drill rigs and support equipment will take about 10-15 minutes. Crews will use signage, cones, and caution tape to give trail users notice about work ahead. Please pay attention to all signs and travel slowly through the work areas.
