## Ensuring decades of safe, reliable sewer service for Redmond

If you live, work or go to school in Redmond, you use King County's Lake Hills and NW Lake Sammamish sewer line every day. Each time you flush a toilet, run a faucet or take a shower, the line sends the water from your drain to be cleaned at King County's Brightwater Treatment Plant in Woodinville.

## A new sewer pipe for a growing community

The Lake Hills sewer pipe has been serving Redmond for 50 years. It is at the end of its service life. King County is working now on plans to replace about four miles of pipe between the Idylwood Neighborhood and Redmond City Hall. Most of the work will occur along the Sammamish River Trail (see map).

Construction is scheduled to begin in 2019. When work is complete, the new Lake Hills and NW Lake Sammamish sewer pipe will be ready to serve Redmond for another 50 years or more. Normal sewer service will be maintained to Redmond residents throughout the project.

## Getting ready to do the job right

You may have seen the project team locating underground utilities and sampling soils to learn more about the project area. The project team will use this information to:

- Avoid service disruptions
- Install the pipe safely
- Minimize impacts to private property owners
- Build a pipe that best uses gravity to keep sewage moving
- Limit disruptions on busy streets and trails when possible
