






What does the Wastewater Treatment Division do?

- Serves 17 cities and 17 sewer districts
- Operates 5 treatment plants and 42 pump stations
- Manages 350+ miles of pipe





Service area and existing system








In the last 50 years, treating the area's wastewater has transformed Lake Washington into one of the cleanest urban lakes in the world.

- The North Mercer / Enatai Interceptor was built in the 1970s.
- Pipeline upgrades will provide safe, reliable service to north
 Mercer Island and southwest Bellevue for the next 50+ years.






What are we building?

Street Restoration



- Full width overlay on SE 24th ST thru intersection with 81st Ave SE
- Half width overlay on 81st Ave SE
- Half width overlay on N. Mercer Way, w/ full width overlay at intersection with 81st Ave and ICW





Anticipated Schedule and duration for work around condo building

- 81st Ave: site prep 1-2 weeks, pipeline 3-4 weeks, restoration 3-4 weeks
- NMW: site prep 1-2 weeks, pipeline 7-8 weeks, restoration 4-5 weeks
- Contractor to be selected near end of 2020,
 Schedule to follow
- WSDOT and City of Mercer Island Permit Conditions








Keeping traffic moving

Construction Update

August 7, 2018

Shoring and more excavation activities begin at station site

Construction continues on the wet weather treatment station at the corner of Fourth Avenue South and South Michigan Street in Georgetown. While the underground Influent Pump Station wall is being completed (see our April 2018 update), other pipes and supporting structures will be installed using sheet piles starting in August.

Steel sheet piles will hold back water and soil while crews dig and excavate soil to install pipes and supporting structures. The sheet piles will be installed using a large piece of equipment called a vibratory hammer. Increased noise and vibration levels are expected as the steel sheet piles are installed.

Crews will be monitoring noise and vibration levels to minimize disruption to the extent possible. Sheet pilling is expected to begin in August and continue through fall 2018. View King County's video on our website to learn more and see a video example of this work.
