#### KCIW Rule Updates coming in 2020

According to an Executive Order signed on January 11, 2016, all King County Executive Policies and Orders and Public Rules written before that date will expire on January 11, 2021. Between now and the end of 2020, we will be revising and renewing the rules listed below. Look for information about the process and your opportunity to give input sent through this email list. - PUT 8-12-1 (PR) King County Industrial Waste Enforcement Response Plan
- PUT 8-13-1 (PR) King County Industrial Waste Local Discharge Limits
- PUT 8-14 (PR) Discharge of Construction Dewatering to the Sanitary Sewer
- PUT 8-15 (PR) Discharge of Contaminated Groundwater to the Sanitary Sewer
- PUT 8-16 (PR) Discharge of Cooling Water into the Sanitary Sewer
- PUT 8-22 (PR) Discharge of Hauled Waste at a King County Publicly Owned Treatment Works (POTW) Treatment Plant

No additional changes will be made to this rule:

## **Changes are coming to Post Violation Inspection and Monitoring Program (PVIMP) Fees**

Companies that violate industrial waste regulations, King County Code, or permit discharge limits must pay fines and reimburse the King County Industrial Waste (KCIW) Program for the staff time spent preparing documents, inspecting and sampling, and the associated laboratory's analytical fees. Over the last five years, the cost of processing the violations has increased but KCIW has not increased the fees for companies who violate the rules. KCIW is now making changes to the PVIMP fees we charge to help us recover our costs resulting from the violation.



On January 1, 2020, KCIW will update PVIMP costs for violators and separate the sampling fees from the fees for laboratory analyses. Separating these charges will make it easier for customers to understand them. In addition, the sampling cost will be based on the type of sampling (e.g. grab vs. composite). Companies will still have the right to appeal enforcement actions against them.

**How to Avoid Penalties:** Late submissions are a frequent and preventable reason for violations and fines. Plan ahead. File your applications and reports on time.

#### Did you know...?

- Your permit shows your specific deadlines.
- You can <u>contact King County</u> and ask for an extension to avoid being late.
- You can send your reports electronically to KCIW by emailing info.KCIW@kingcounty.gov.

King County is legally required to report on companies who do not comply with their permit. Read the fall enforcement ad published in the Seattle Times in October.
