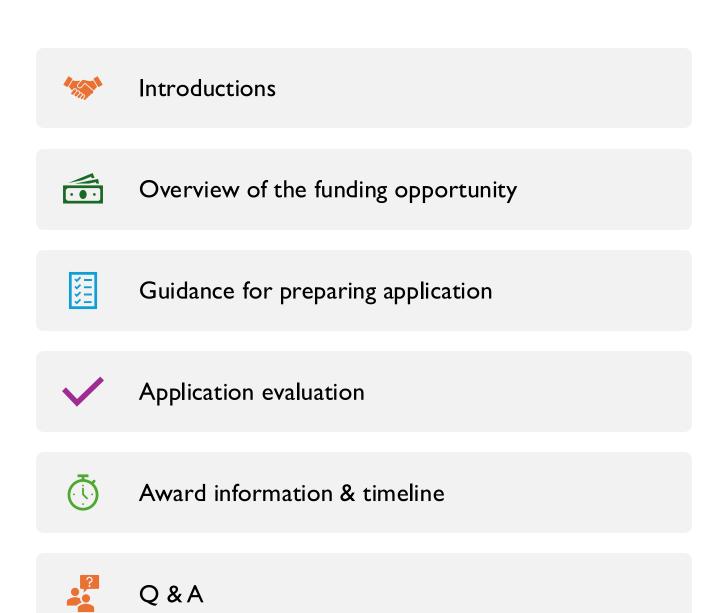

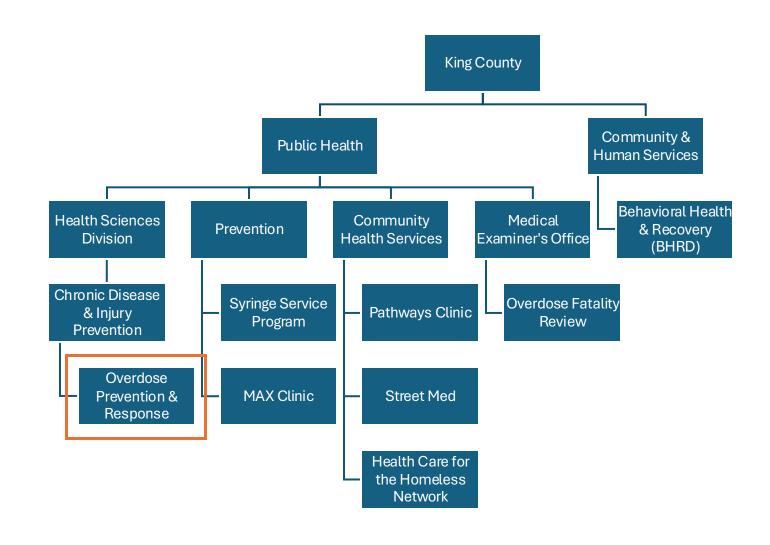

Overdose Prevention and Response Program

- Current funding opportunity is housed within the Overdose Prevention & Response Program.
- Overdose Prevention & Response has several programming to address overdose in King County including:
- I. epidemiologic surveillance and data,
- 2. convening housing service providers,
- 3. management of the Opioid Settlement Fund.
- 4. operating a Naloxone and Supply Clearinghouse,
- 5. working with EMS, and more!
- This funding opportunity will be overseen by the training and communications team.



Overview of the Funding Opportunity



Background on Overdose Stigma Reduction and Community Engagement Projects



Funding Source and Goal

- In 2023, Public Health-Seattle & King County (PHSKC) received a five-year CDC grant through the Overdose Data to Action: LOCAL program. This funding supports overdose prevention work, including efforts to reduce stigma toward people who use drugs.
- The goal is to increase understanding of stigma among both community members and professionals, and to strengthen connections to care.
- To help carry out this work, PHSKC is making CDC grant funds available to local, community-based organizations through this RFA.
- Funded projects will focus on **reducing substance use stigma** and preventing overdose in the communities most impacted.

Goals of the Funding Opportunity

Fund projects that:

- (a) are led by and/or meaningfully engage, BIPOC communities (especially Black, African American, American Indian/Alaskan Native communities); and
- (b) are implemented in South King County with a focus on adults (25 years and older) as the primary audience (but may include youth, 24 years and younger).

(South King County as geographically defined by Health Reporting Areas and regionally impacted by increased overdosed deaths noted in King County's Overdose Data Dashboards).

This RFA seeks to fund two types of projects:

- 1. Community-based Training and Engagement
- 2. Communications and Messaging





Funding Project Types

You may apply for one OR both project types

Community-based Training and Engagement

- (a) Offer stigma reduction trainings for specific cultural or community groups. These can be part of broader overdose or substance use education.
- (b) Lead community education that shares real stories of how stigma affects people who use drugs and their communities.
- (c) Work to reduce stigma within organizations or communities, and promote approaches that support the health, dignity, and safety of people who use drugs (PWUD).
- (d) Peer-led, culturally responsive, and /or language-accessible

Communications and Messaging:

- (a) Use storytelling, art, or media to shift harmful views about substance use, overdose, harm reduction, or treatment.
- (b) Share real stories from the community—through videos, zines, social media, posters, podcasts, or public art.
- (c) Run campaigns that challenge stigma and highlight the humanity and dignity of people who use drugs (PWUD).
- (d) Share clear, easy-to-understand information about overdose prevention tools and resources.



Goals of the Funding Opportunity

- Fund South King County communities most impacted by fatal overdoses.
- The total funding opportunity is \$220,000.
- You may apply for up to \$45,000
- We aim to make ~5 awards ranging from \$25,000 \$45,000
- Projects must occur/be implemented over an eleven month-period (funds to be issued between October 1, 2025 August 31, 2026).

Outcomes



Decrease stigma and improve attitudes and knowledge about substance use, overdose, evidence-based substance use disorder treatment, and PWUD.



Strengthens supportive interactions between PWUD and community organizations, service providers, or healthcare providers.

Guidance for Preparing Applications



Proposal Narrative

General instructions:

- A complete application includes
- I. A signed cover letter
- 2. Document that includes responses to all narrative questions including description of your organization, your proposed project and deliverables, how community will be involved and who you are trying to reach, project impact, a budget, and a timeline
- Use the narrative questions to structure your proposal, paying particular attention to the scoring criteria.
- Be sure to read formatting instructions (no more than 8 pages, size 11pt font)





Budget & Budget Narrative

- Proposals may request up to \$45,000
- The budget should cover all project costs for an 11-month period (ending Aug 30, 2026)
- Submit a budget a format as shown in narrative question 2:
 - table within a document (e.g., Word)

Application Evaluation



Scoring Criteria

- Criteria correspond directly to the narrative prompts
- Scores are based on the degree to which proposals align with the criteria

Application Review Process



All application will be reviewed by a panel of 4 internal/community reviewers and 2 internal to Public Health reviewers. Reviewers include PWLLE of drug use, professionals with subject matter expertise related to the funding opportunity. Reviewers complete a bias and conflict of interest training, then sign a confidentiality agreement and make disclosures.

Reviewers evaluate all applications and assign scores based upon the given criteria. Reviewers participate in a meeting to discuss their scores and make awards based on their aggregate scores. If reviewers are unable to come to a final decision or have additional questions about a proposals, interview s are conducted.

If your proposal is not awarded funding, you may request feedback on your application.

Award Information & Timeline



Things to know about the award...

If awarded, PHSKC will:

- Use your proposal narrative and proposed budget to draft a scope of work and budget for the contract, including reporting requirements and an invoicing template.
- Potentially request changes to your proposed deliverables or proposed budget.
- Release funds based on completion of deliverables and the proposed budget.
- Meet with you to discuss any changes you would like to make to the scope of work and budget.

Reporting Requirements



PHSKC will work with awardees to determine best reporting methods for reaching deliverables, documenting outputs, evaluating change, etc.

Invoicing Requirements



Submit an invoice (using a provided template) at completion of a deliverable



County will pay not more that 30 days after completion of an invoice

A1: **Yes**, you can apply. The strongest applications will include organizations and groups that demonstrate history and connection to impacted communities in South King County.

Q2: "Do I have to do both a training and comms in our project to apply? Is one better than the other?"

Al: **No**, you're welcome to propose training **or** comms projects that meet the anti-stigma needs of your community. You may also propose a project that incorporates both training and communications projects.
