

Toothbrushing at Sink

Every site is unique and instructions below may need to be modified.

Prepare

- Each child has their own toothbrush with their name clearly labeled on the handle. No sharing or borrowing is allowed.
- Use a handwashing sink in the classroom (not bathroom). Clean, rinse, and disinfect the faucet and sink.
- Children and teachers assisting with activity wash hands before brushing teeth. Teachers may also put on disposable gloves.
- Fill a pitcher with water from a clean water source (for example, a food preparation sink or water dispenser).
- To avoid cross-contamination, teacher dispenses dots of fluoridated toothpaste around rim of cup or plate (as pictured).
 - Under 3 yrs old → rice-sized dots

3-6 yrs old → pea-sized dots
Replace toothbrushes every 3-4
months, or sooner if it comes in contact
with another child's toothbrush or an
unclean surface, or is used by a
different child, or when bristles become
frayed or worn out.

Supervise Toothbrushing



- Teacher takes child's toothbrush from rack, puts a single dot of alreadydispensed toothpaste on brush, then hands child their toothbrush along with a paper cup containing a small amount of clean water.
- Child begins brushing on the biting surface, then around the mouth from left-to-right and top-to-bottom. Brushing continues for 2 minutes. (Exposure to fluoridated toothpaste is beneficial even with unsatisfactory brushing technique.)
- Child takes small sip of water from the cup and spits water and toothpaste residue into sink or cup.
- Child holds the toothbrush over the sink and the teacher pours clean water from the pitcher over the toothbrush to rinse it. (Never use water from handwashing sink to rinse toothbrush.)



Clean up

- Child gives toothbrush to teacher, who puts it in the child's designated spot on the drying rack.
- Child throws away the paper cup.
- Children wash their hands after brushing.
- Sink is cleaned with the 3-step process (clean, rinse, disinfect).

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
