J. Sakuma	Present OAC work to date	J. Sakuma presented on OAC work to date: defining reporting requirements, developing website, and developing and launching first reporting survey.
B. Finegood	OAC roles and responsibilities	B. Finegood clarified OAC’s roles and responsibilities. OAC’s role is to: 1. Ensure accounting and reporting by cities and King County 2. Provide a mechanism for transparency around settlement processes OAC does not make decisions about spending for any city or county, have authority to enforce programmatic outcome reporting, or dictate appropriate community input processes.
K. Hay	Reporting prep survey results	K. Hay summarized the survey OAC conducted in October, specifically the cities who reported interest in pooling funds. OAC clarified that there is not a current mechanism for this, and it is not within OAC’s role to coordinate. Interested cities should reach out to each other to discuss further.
A. Borges	Review reporting requirements and survey	A. Borges reviewed reporting requirements and the current reporting questions (due Feb. 23 rd for all cities).
All	Q&A	OAC opened the meeting for discussion and Q&A from cities. J. Joly clarified that Teva & Allergen, Walmart, Walgreens, & CVS settlements have yet to announce distribution.
