### WHO WE ARE + WHAT WE DO

We prepare for and respond to emergencies:

- We create plans to help our region be ready and stay safe during disasters.
- During disasters, we coordinate emergency services, including sending alerts and notifications about emergency situations.
- We are committed to serving the whole community.

### **OUTCOMES FROM A WILDFIRE**

- In recent years, eastern WA has had terrible wildfires.
- Evacuation orders for Spanish speakers were poorly translated and not issued quickly enough.
- Community activists worked with legislators to ensure emergency information reaches everyone.



### 2017 NEW STATE LAW - RCW 38.52.070

- Emergency Management jurisdiction must provide emergency notifications to significant portions of the community in a manner they can understand
- Anyone in harm's way should be informed
- Everyone should be informed of actions they can take to protect themselves

### WHAT EMERGENCY MANAGERS MUST DO

- Identify language groups that make up 5% of the population or 1,000 residents, whichever is less.
- Develop plans to send emergency alerts to these language groups with information about actions people can take to protect their safety.
