

1. **Improve public safety** by increasing tools and resources, including local taxing authority, to address auto theft and property crime and to support officer recruitment and retention.

SB 5056	Creates a special allegation and sentencing enhancement for “habitual property offenders”	Passed Senate (38Y 10N); referred to House Community Safety, Justice & Reentry
SB 5424	Allows general and limited authority Washington law enforcement agencies to adopt flexible work policies	Passed Senate unanimously; referred to House Community Safety Justice & Reentry
SB 6261	Creates penalties for theft of property or equipment used by firefighters or emergency medical service providers	1/29 scheduled for public hearing in Senate Law & Justice; 1/30 scheduled for executive session

2. **Address the behavioral health treatment crisis** by increasing the capacity of the crisis response system and funding local programs that connect individuals with needed care and diversion programs.

HB 2408	Requires the crisis call center system platform used by designated 988 contact hubs to be capable of allowing any crisis line dedicated to the needs of American Indian and Alaska Native persons to receive crisis assistance	1/26 scheduled for executive session in House Health Care & Wellness
HB 2247	Addresses behavioral health provider shortages by changing licensing requirements, practice settings and reimbursement requirements for various behavioral health professions	1/30 scheduled for executive session in House Health Care & Wellness
SB 6251	Requires behavioral health administrative service organizations to serve as the primary system coordinators within each of ten regional service areas	1/26 scheduled for executive session in Senate Health & Long Term Care
SB 6295	Creates an enhanced, integrated care approach to provide resources for the highest users of competency services	1/26 scheduled for public hearing in Senate Health & Long Term Care
