## Why the name "Barbershop"?

The notion of a *Barbershop* has a long-standing history as a safe and trusted gathering place for meaningful conversations; a cornerstone of communities. A place where people could gather, free from hierarchy, to talk openly about the issues of the outside world.

Our concept of *The Barbershop* stems from these same tenants, a place where people can speak freely about meaningful issues, with open dialogue from many perspectives.



# The Barbershop

The Barbershop workshop is designed to invite key voices to the table from both law enforcement and those in our communities who have been system impacted.

We began this initiative with the proven notion that "Those closest to the problem are also closest to the solution". As we moved through our first few workshops, we quickly realized that the solution is relationship-driven.

If we are to re-build trust between law enforcement and community, we need to invest in the relationship. Not unlike any other important relationship, the key ingredients of communication, empathy, and a desire to understand one another are critical if we are to develop a strong foundation for community policing.





Most investments in human beings begin with this notion. Whether it is learning, or therapy, it doesn't work when we try to jump from the bottom rung to the top. We begin by stepping on the first rung, gaining balance there before stepping on the next rung, and we move our way up.

The rungs of The Barbershop process:







#### Behavior is now influenced by a different set of data points

 As police and community members engage with each other going forward, their experiences during the Barbershop workshop inform how they choose to show up

#### Revelation of community member background/lived experience

- Evidence builds that the solution is relationship driven; we are all human beings with different life experiences

Gradual realization that all the people in the room, regardless of life experience or previous bias, want the same things (white board Public Safety discussion)

## Create a structured space where stories and experiences can be shared as it relates to perspectives on public safety

- Workshop designed to warm up participants, draw out their experiences and ideas, and apply to a real life scenario to test realistic applications of ideas


#### Gather members from both areas in the same room

- Police believe they are meeting with community advocates. We began with recruits because they are the most eager to make a difference
- Community members know they are meeting with police, and have bravely overcome their own biases and fears in favor of change

#### Connect with key members of Police and in Community

- Folks that have a heart for a change for where we have been and where we are going in the areas of community policing and public safety
