

Information exchange within KCSO




Contracted Navigator

Funding

- Initial grant from King County Sheriff's Office and Department of Justice
- MIDD funding to expand to all five cities
- Trueblood grant through Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs
- Department of Justice Bureau of Justice Assistance Grant

The vision of full implementation

- Hybrid of co-response and community response
- MHP Navigators available 7 days/ week at peak hours to respond across all five cities (with evolution to 24/7)
- Fleet vehicles allow independent and proactive response when appropriate
- Navigators on radio
- Response Plans accessible across jurisdictions
